The ICE 287(g) Program: A Law Enforcement Partnership

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), the largest investigative agency in the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), is responsible for enforcing federal immigration laws as part of its homeland security mission. ICE works closely with federal, state and local law enforcement partners in this mission.

The 287(g) Program, one of ICE's top partnership initiatives, allows state and local law enforcement entities to enter into a partnership with ICE, under a joint Memorandum of Agreement (MOA), in order to receive delegated authority for immigration enforcement within their jurisdictions. The 287(g) Program has emerged as one of the agency's most successful and popular partnership initiatives as more state and local leaders have come to understand how a shared approach to immigration enforcement can benefit their communities.

ICE ACCESS: A Partnership Approach

The 287(g) Program is one component under the ICE ACCESS (Agreements of Cooperation in Communities to Enhance Safety and Security) program umbrella of services, which provides local law enforcement agencies an opportunity to team with ICE to combat specific challenges in their communities. ICE developed the ACCESS program in response to widespread interest from local law enforcement agencies who have requested ICE assistance through the 287(g) Program, which trains local officers to enforce immigration law as authorized under section 287(g) of the Immigration and Nationality Act.

Terrorism and criminal activity are most effectively combated through a multi-agency/multi-authority approach that encompasses federal, state and local resources, skills and expertise. State and local law enforcement play a critical role in protecting our homeland because they are often the first responders when there is an incident or attack against the United States. During the course of daily duties, they often encounter foreign-born criminals and immigration violators who may pose a threat to national security or public safety.

History of 287(g)

The Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996 added Section 287(g), performance of immigration officer functions by state officers and employees, to the Immigration and Nationality Act. This authorizes DHS to enter into agreements with state and local law enforcement agencies, permitting designated officers to perform immigration law enforcement functions, provided those officers receive appropriate training and function under the supervision of ICE officers.

State and local officers, detectives, investigators and correctional officers work in conjunction with ICE. The purpose of this collaboration is to identify and process for removal criminal aliens who pose a threat to public safety or are a danger to the community. In addition, participating entities are eligible for increased resources and support in more remote geographical locations.

Memorandum of Agreement (MOA)

Memoranda of agreement are written so that the use of 287(g) authority is aligned with ICE priorities. An MOA defines the scope and limitations of the authority to be designated. It also establishes the supervisory structure for the officers working under the cross-designation and prescribes the agreed upon complaint process governing officer conduct during the life of the MOA. Under the statute, ICE will supervise all cross-designated officers when they exercise their immigration authorities. The agreement must be signed by the ICE Assistant Secretary, and the governor, a senior political entity, or the head of the local agency before trained local officers are authorized to enforce immigration law.

Law Enforcement Agency Requirements for 287(g) Partnership

- Agencies must enter into a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA)
- Supervising political entity approval
- Sufficient criminal activity involving removable foreign born individuals
- The program must enhance the safety and security of communities focusing on the removal of criminal aliens who pose a threat to public safety or a danger to the community
- Agencies must provide office space for ICE supervisor
- Officers must attend a four-week training program

Additional Evaluation Factors

- Agency's proximity to ICE office
- Number of alien encounters per month
- Types of Encounters (Level 1, 2, and 3)
 - Level 1 Aliens who have been convicted of or arrested for major drug offenses and/or violent offenses such as murder, manslaughter, rape, robbery and kidnapping;
 - Level 2 Aliens who have been convicted of or arrested for minor drug offenses and/or mainly property offenses such as burglary, larceny, fraud and money laundering; and

- Level 3 Aliens who have been convicted of or arrested for other offenses.
- Number of officers to be trained
- Approved ICE detention space available
- Other <u>ICE ACCESS</u> programs or opportunities in area

Officer Selection Requirements

Participating officers in the 287(g) Program must meet the following minimum requirements:

- U.S. citizenship;
- Current background investigation completed;
- Task Force Officers must have a minimum one year experience in law enforcement that includes experience in interviewing witnesses, interrogating subjects, providing constitutional rights warnings, obtaining statements, and executing search and seizure warrants;
- Jail Enforcement Officers must have experience supervising incarcerated individuals; and
- No disciplinary actions pending.

Training Requirements

ICE offers a four-week training program conducted by certified instructors at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) ICE Academy (ICEA) in Charleston, S.C.

287(g) Results and Participating Entities

Since January 2006, the 287(g) Program is credited with identifying more than 110,000 individuals, mostly in jails, who are suspected of being in the country in violation of immigration law. More than 980 officers have been trained and certified through the program under 66 active MOAs, as follows:

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BUREAU OF JUSTICE ASSISTANCE STATE CRIMINAL ALIEN ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (SCAAP)

NEW: Use of SCAAP Awards

The Department of Justice Reauthorization Act of 2005 (Pub. L. 109-162, Title XI) included the following requirement regarding the use of SCAAP funds: "Amounts appropriated pursuant to the authorization of appropriations in paragraph (5) that are distributed to a State or political subdivision of a State, including a municipality, may be used only for correctional purposes." Beginning with FY 2007 SCAAP awards, SCAAP funds must be used for correctional purposes only. Jurisdictions receiving SCAAP awards will be asked to report the projected use of these funds at the time the award is accepted.

PART I: SCAAP Guidelines

SCAAP Overview

The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice, administers SCAAP, in conjunction with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS). SCAAP provides federal payments to states and localities that incurred correctional officer salary costs for incarcerating undocumented criminal aliens who have at least one felony or two misdemeanor convictions for violations of state or local law, and who are incarcerated for at least 4 consecutive days during the reporting period.

SCAAP Legislative Authority

SCAAP is governed by Section 241(i) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, 8 U.S.C. § 1231(i), as amended, and Title II, Subtitle C, Section 20301, Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994, Pub. L. 103-322. In general terms, if a chief executive officer of a state or a political subdivision exercises authority over the incarceration of undocumented criminal aliens and submits a written request to the U.S. Attorney General, the Attorney General may provide compensation to that jurisdiction for those incarceration costs. SCAAP is subject to additional terms and conditions of yearly congressional appropriations.

Eligible Applicants

States and local units of government that have authority over correctional facilities that incarcerate or detain undocumented criminal aliens for a minimum of 4 consecutive days are eligible to apply for SCAAP funds. States and local units of general government include the 50 state governments, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and the more than 3,000 counties and cities with correctional facilities.

Regional jails, special jail districts, or regional jail authorities and boards do not qualify as political subdivisions of a state for purposes of SCAAP, and therefore are not eligible to directly apply for SCAAP funds. Each unit of government that houses inmates at a regional facility must apply independently for SCAAP funds, based on its own costs of housing its undocumented aliens in the regional facility. Regional facilities may not submit SCAAP applications on behalf of jurisdictions in its service area, nor may a regional facility submit one application for all participating jurisdictions, using one jurisdiction's name as the recipient.

Authorized Officials

SCAAP payments must go directly to eligible states and localities. Authorized jurisdiction employees for SCAAP purposes must be listed as either the Authorized Representative or Alternate Contact in the GMS User Profile. The chief executive officer (CEO) of an eligible jurisdiction may apply directly or delegate authority to another jurisdiction official. The CEO is generally considered the highest ranking elected or appointed official of a unit of government.

Minimum Period of Incarceration

Only eligible persons who were incarcerated for 4 or more consecutive days between July 1, 2007 and June 30, 2008 may be included in the FY 2009 SCAAP application.

Multi-Jurisdictional Issues

Eligible inmates housed in the applicant's facility exclusively on behalf of another jurisdiction may only be

reported by the sending jurisdiction, regardless of whether the applicant received reimbursement for related incarceration costs.

- Unless otherwise covered by a cost reimbursement agreement, inmates who are ready for release once
 qualifying charges or convictions are concluded, and who are temporarily held in the applicant facility on
 the basis of outstanding warrants or detainers from other jurisdictions, including federal law enforcement
 agencies, are SCAAP eligible. The applicant jurisdiction may claim the total number of days the inmate
 was in custody, including the days the inmate was held on the detainers or outstanding warrants.
- Detention or incarceration days attributable to otherwise qualifying inmates held on federal charges, convictions, or detainers and covered by cost reimbursement agreements are not SCAAP eligible.
- Juveniles adjudicated delinquent, regardless of the charges or length of custody, are not SCAAP eligible.
 Only juvenile offenders who are convicted as adults and who meet the qualifying SCAAP criteria may be eligible.

Eligible Inmates

Applicants may submit records of inmates in their custody during the reporting period who:

- Were born outside the United States or one of its territories and had no reported or documented claim to U.S. citizenship.
- Were in the applicant's custody for 4 or more consecutive days during the reporting period.
- Were convicted of a felony or second misdemeanor for violations of state or local law.
- Were identified and reported as undocumented, using due diligence.

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security will make the final determination on the status of submitted inmate records for undocumented alien purposes. Inmates may qualify for SCAAP purposes if they were:

- Persons who entered the U.S. without inspection or at any time or place other than as designated by the Attorney General.
- Persons in deportation or exclusion proceedings at the time they were taken into custody.
- Non-immigrants who failed to maintain their non-immigrant status at the time they were taken into custody.
- Certain Mariel Cubans who otherwise meet these requirements.

Total All Inmate Days

The "total all inmate days" is the cumulative number of incarceration or detention days attributable to *all* inmates housed in the jurisdiction's facilities during the reporting period. It includes all inmates, regardless of their status, citizenship, disposition, or length of stay, including inmates held at contract facilities. A jurisdiction can use the sum of all nightly, facility head counts for the 365 days in the reporting period.

EXAMPLE	TOTAL DAYS
A jurisdiction detained or incarcerated 400 inmates during the current reporting cycle. Each inmate was held for exactly 7 days.	2,800 (400 inmates x 7 days)

Criminal Charges and Convictions

To be eligible for reporting, inmates must have been convicted of a felony or second misdemeanor for violations of state or local law, and housed in the applicant's state or local correctional facility for 4 or more consecutive days during the reporting period. All pretrial and post conviction time served from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008 may be reported to BJA.

EXAMPLES	REPORTABLE DAYS
An alien was convicted of a felony during the reporting period and spent 20 days in pretrial detention and 60 additional days from the conviction. All 80 days occurred during the reporting period.	80
An alien was convicted of a felony during the reporting period and spent 20 days in pretrial detention and 60 additional days from the conviction. The 20 pretrial detention days and 40 of the sentenced days occurred in the reporting period; the remaining 20 days were served after June 30, 2008.	60
An alien was convicted of a felony several years ago and is being held in pretrial detention on new charges. As this alien already qualifies based on the prior felony conviction, once he meets the minimum of 4 consecutive days in custody during the reporting period, the pretrial days may be reported to BJA, regardless of the outcome of the pending charges.	As calculated
An alien was convicted of a second misdemeanor and served 3 consecutive days as of June 30, 2007, and 20 additional days after June 30, 2008. This inmate cannot be reported for FY 2009, but will qualify for FY 2010. NOTE: The first 3 days of the sentence are not reportable, regardless of what occurs with this inmate in the future.	0

Required Inmate Data Format

The <u>detailed inmate file</u> reflects the jurisdiction's good faith and due diligence efforts to identify and list undocumented criminal aliens housed in its correctional facilities. Required inmate data elements include the A-Number, if known; last, middle, and first names; date of birth; unique inmate number assigned by the applicant jurisdiction; foreign country of birth; date taken into custody; date released from custody; and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) number, if known.

For inmates with aliases or multiple periods of incarceration: Creating a separate and distinct inmate record for each qualifying period of incarceration may include eligible inmates incarcerated more than once during the reporting period. Similarly, inmates with known aliases may be reported by creating a separate and distinct inmate record for each name. The same unique inmate identification number must be used for all records associated with a single inmate, regardless of the name under which the inmate was incarcerated. Applications submitted without complete facility data and inmate records will not be considered for SCAAP funding.

Country of Birth Codes

Generally, a person born in the U.S. or a U.S. territory is a U.S. citizen and should not be reported. Any submitted inmate record that includes a country code not on the official ICE country codes list will be rejected. Any record with an official country code that does not specifically represent a foreign country (unknown) will only be considered in the award calculation if determined the inmate is undocumented or otherwise qualifies. If the country provided by the inmate is not on the official list, select a country with a close geographic proximity to the one named by the inmate.

Alternatives to Traditional Incarceration

Inmates are not eligible if they served their incarceration incrementally, such as through weekend incarcerations that enabled them to maintain employment. Qualifying periods of incarceration must occur consecutively over the course of 4 or more days.

Parole and Probation Violators

Eligible inmates on parole or probation from qualifying convictions who are subsequently returned to the

custody of a state or local correctional facility may be eligible.

Correctional Officers

Correctional officers include employees, officers, and contractual staff whose primary responsibility is the control, custody, or supervision of persons detained and incarcerated, including correctional officers, deputy sheriffs, correctional/jail supervisors, shift commanders, chiefs of security, assistant wardens, and wardens. Transportation officers and others providing control, custody, or supervision of inmates who are temporarily outside the maintaining facility are also eligible. Employees, officers, and contractual staff whose primary responsibility is providing noncustody services to the facility or its inmate population are not SCAAP eligible, including office and secretarial support, administrative, housekeeping, maintenance, food, health, education, training, vocational, counseling, and medical staff. Staff who function independently or outside the correctional facility, including parole and probation agents, hearing officers, court commissioners, judicial, prosecutorial, and public defenders, warrant and apprehension units, and others are not eligible.

Correctional Officer Salary Calculation

Salary information reported in the SCAAP application must reflect the total salaries and wages paid to full- and part-time correctional officers and others who meet the SCAAP definition. The reported sum should total the jurisdiction's actual salary expenditures for the reporting period, not an estimate or average. Correctional officer salary costs may include premium pay for specialized service, shift differential pay, and fixed-pay increases for time in service. It may also include overtime required by negotiated contract, statute, or regulation such as union agreements, contractual obligations, and required post staffing minimums.

Per Diem Costs

Per diem cost is calculated by the SCAAP system, dividing the jurisdiction's "total all inmate days" into the "total correctional officer salary costs." During the FY 2007 reporting period, jurisdictions reported an average per diem cost of \$30.30. BJA may require documentation to validate per diem costs or impose limits on the costs.

SCAAP Award Calculation

Once SCAAP data has been validated and analyzed, applicants will receive e-mail notification that awards are ready for online acceptance and drawdown. Formal acceptance of an award via GMS is necessary for the electronic transfer of funds into the applicant's bank account of record. Applicants have 45 calendar days to accept awards through GMS once notice is provided. SCAAP payments must go to the jurisdictions' general fund.

Payment Formula

The following provides an overview of the method used to calculate SCAAP payments

- 1. Using financial data from applicants, a per diem rate is calculated for each jurisdiction. For FY 2007, the average per diem rate was \$30.30 per inmate.
- 2. Inmate data is provided to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to validate inmate data for eligible, unknown, and invalid records.
- 3. Each jurisdiction's total eligible inmate days and a percentage of the unknown days are totaled then multiplied by the applicant's per diem rate to derive the total correctional officer salary costs for eligible and unknown inmate days. The percentage used for unknown days is determined by a sliding scale: cities 60 percent; states 65 percent; and counties 80 percent of their total unknown inmate days.
- 4. The value of each applicant's correctional officer salary costs associated with its eligible and credited unknown inmate days are totaled. This total value reflects the maximum amount for SCAAP reimbursement. A percentage factor is used to reflect the relationship between the maximum reimbursable salary costs and the appropriation. For FY 2007, this factor was approximately 41.98 percent.

Variances

A variance will exist between the total salary costs reported by a jurisdiction and the final SCAAP payment amount, due to adjustments for unknown, ineligible, or invalid inmate records and the annual appropriation. Both the SCAAP system and BJA check for variances from prior year submissions for correctional officer staffing and salary levels, total bed count, and number of total inmate days.

PART II: Applying for FY 2009 SCAAP Funds

FY 2009 Reporting Period

The FY 2009 SCAAP reporting period is from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008.

FY 2009 Registration and Application Deadlines

Applications will be accepted through the online Grants Management System (GMS) beginning April 6, 2008, and ending at 5:00 p.m. e.t. on May 12, 2008.

GMS Application Process

The SCAAP Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) number is 16.606.

For questions or concerns at any point in the GMS process, call the SCAAP Help Desk at 1-202-353-4411.

- 1. Access GMS at https://grants.ojp.usdoj.gov.
- 2. If you already have a GMS user ID, proceed to the GMS sign in. Even if your organization already has a user ID, you will not be considered registered for the solicitation until you have signed on to GMS and entered the appropriate solicitation.
- 3. If you do not have a GMS user ID, select "New User? Register Here." After you have completed all of the required information, click "Create Account" at the bottom of the page and to note your user ID and password, which are case sensitive. Within a few days, BJA will send an e-mail confirmation to newly registered applicants that their user ID and password have been approved and they are eligible to submit an application.
- 4. Beginning October 1, 2003, a Dun and Bradstreet (D&B) Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) number must be included in every application for a new award or renewal of an award. The DUNS number will be required whether an applicant is submitting an application on paper, through OJP's Grants Management System, or using the governmentwide electronic portal (Grants. gov). An application will not be considered complete until the applicant provides a valid DUNS number.
 - Organizations should verify that they have a DUNS number or take the steps necessary to obtain one as soon as possible. Applicants can receive a DUNS number at no cost by calling the dedicated toll-free DUNS number request line at 1–800–333–0505.
- 5. After you have logged onto the system using your user ID and password, click on "Funding Opportunities."
- 6. Select the "Bureau of Justice Assistance" from the drop-down list and click "Search." This will narrow the list of solicitations within the Office of Justice Programs to those in BJA.
- 7. From the list of BJA grants, find "State Criminal Alien Assistance Program" and click "Apply Online."
- 8. Confirm that your organization is eligible to apply for this program by reading the text on the screen. If eligible, proceed by clicking "Continue."
- 9. Once you have reached this point, you are considered successfully registered.

Online Inmate Data Reporting Process

Select the file upload process below that best meets your needs. While you may change the method prior to submitting the completed application to BJA, note that the change from one process to another will overwrite and delete all previous inmate record submissions.

 Direct File Upload: The direct file upload function allows you to submit inmate database records in a single ASCII-formatted file directly into GMS. File uploads must contain the mandatory data fields in the required format. File uploads that do not include the necessary information will be considered incomplete

- and not eligible SCAAP funding. The SCAAP system provides you with an opportunity to correct files or add missing data prior to finalizing the application.
- **Direct Data Entry:** The direct data entry function allows you to manually enter inmate data directly into an online inmate data template, instead of creating a separate ASCII file. This approach may be best suited for jurisdictions with smaller facilities or small criminal alien populations. Drop-down menus are provided for selecting incarceration dates, date of birth, and country of birth (complete country names are listed).

During the file upload process, a red flashing bar will appear at the bottom of the applicant screen. This bar will continue to flash until the inmate file upload is complete. Upon completion of the inmate file upload, SCAAP GMS will provide the applicant with a "File Upload Status Report." This report will list the number of inmate records in the upload and the number of inmate records that are complete. In addition, the report will provide a detailed list of inmate records (by file number) that are incomplete or have data format errors and the nature of the error. Print this file upload status report for your records. If during the file upload process, your Internet browser times out or is disconnected, your inmate file upload may not be complete. It is important that you check the "File Upload Status Report" and verify that all of your inmate records have been uploaded.

When initiating a file upload, there is an approximate 10 second start-up delay. Once the file upload has actually begun, the estimated times for file uploads: 300 inmate records = less than 1 minute; 7,800 inmate records = 3 minutes; 54,600 inmate records = 15 minutes.

Technical System Requirements

Internet access is required to apply for SCAAP funding. Generally, Netscape Communicator 4.7 and Internet Explorer 5.5 are the earliest versions of the respective Internet browsers that may be used for successful SCAAP application system access. Contact your agency network administrator to determine if an internal firewall or agency Internet security system may be preventing direct access to the application system, or contact the GMS Help Desk for information regarding correct port settings. If you are a prior SCAAP user, the browser bookmark may not work properly and an attempt to access the SCAAP application site may generate a message advising that the "page cannot be displayed." Delete the bookmark and manually type the URL into the browser address line.

Internet User Accounts

Government officials from the applying jurisdictions must establish the OJP GMS user accounts for SCAAP. Non-government officials may not establish user accounts on behalf of applying jurisdictions. When establishing a user account, sheriffs or chiefs of police are not considered CEOs, but they may serve as the contact persons establishing the SCAAP user accounts on behalf of the CEOs. All applications must be filed in the name of the state or unit of government and must include the jurisdiction's CEO's name, official title, and e-mail address.

Application Resubmissions

BJA may return a submitted application with incomplete or inaccurate data to the applicant for corrections, and will notify both the CEO and the SCAAP contact, via the e-mail address of record, that their application needs to be corrected and resubmitted by a certain date to be considered for SCAAP funding.

The table below shows the required inmate data elements and the required ASCII fixed-field format. Two elements are not mandatory but should be included if available. When creating your inmate data file for uploading in GMS, follow the format requirements very carefully. **DO NOT USE THE TAB KEY** when filling in your data - **USE THE SPACE BAR** when your inmate information does not require the use of all the available spaces in a given field and you need to advance to the beginning of the next field.

Enforcement and Removal Operations (ERO) must be diligent in its screening of individuals prior to lodging a detainer or taking a person into custody. It is imperative all records are reviewed to ensure that the subject of an investigation is properly identified to determine a subject's status or removability.

FODs are reminded that since the implementation of the Encounter Policy (see attached) that all individuals identified must only have one ERO encounter in ENFORCE for the entire law enforcement action. Therefore, to prevent the creation of new encounters for those already identified, officers must search ENFORCE, as well as other routine ICE databases when checking an individual's status.

In addition to ensuring compliance with the above policy, a thorough search allows for the immediate identification of previously encountered naturalized or derivative citizens to prevent their placement into ICE custody, as well as managing cases of individuals previously arrested by a law enforcement agency that were not previously subject to removal. This ensures those individuals are re-investigated to determine removability.

- 1. Purpose/Background. This directive identifies requirements and provides general procedures for using the Enforcement Integrated Database (EID) as ERO's electronic system of records for administrative processing of foreign born nationals. EID is the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) shared database repository for several DHS law enforcement and homeland security applications and is currently accessed through the Enforcement and Case Tracking System (ENFORCE) application.
- 1.1 The purpose of the directive is to support the identification and arrest of individuals (both citizens and noncitizens) who commit violations of Federal criminal laws enforced by DHS.
- **2. Policy.** All ERO law enforcement officers will document foreign born national encounters in the EID (e.g., using the ENFORCE application).
- Definitions.
- **3.1.** *Encounter*: the interview, screening, and determination of citizenship, nationality, and legal rights of any person in the United States at any time.
- **3.2.** *Interview:* a formal meeting in which a law enforcement officer questions a person believed to be an alien about citizenship, nationality, and the legal right to be in the United States.
- **3.3.** Screening: the process of verifying the identity of a person through biographic and or biometric identifiers.
- **3.4.** Biographic identifiers: personal information obtained from a person or third party (e.g., name, address, social security number, driver's license).
- **3.5.** Biometric identifiers: identity analysis of physical samples obtained from a person or provided by a third party (e.g., fingerprints).

3.6. Enforcement action: a law enforcement activity (e.g., encounter, investigative detention, arrest, bond) taken by DHS to address criminal or administrative violations.

4. Responsibilities.

- **4.1.** The *Criminal Alien Division* is the Office of Primary Interest and is responsible for managing and overseeing compliance to this Directive.
- **4.2** All ERO law enforcement officers who encounter persons are responsible for documenting that encounter in the Enforcement Integrated Database (e.g., by using ENFORCE).

5. Procedures.

5.1. Law enforcement officers:

- 1) Document encounters in the Enforcement Integrated Database (e.g., by using ENFORCE).
- Create only one encounter based on the same enforcement action for the same person. Enter any crime information necessary to correctly indicate a foreign born national's criminal offense level (e.g., in ENFORCE through the CRIME ENTRY SCREEN).
- 3) Input as an encounter subjects found through investigation to be derived or naturalized citizens.
- 4) If you determine that a person initially detained as a possible alien is a United States citizen, notate the record with your determination and state that no further action will be taken.
- Do not enter information about U.S. citizens interviewed or screened unless being investigated or arrested for administrative or criminal immigration law violations.

287(g) QUICK REFERENCE PROCESSING GUIDE

This Quick Reference Guide is designed for the processing of foreign nationals under the auspices of the 287(g) program.

Information contained herein is to be treated as Law Enforcement Sensitive. Do not share this document in any form with anyone who does not have a need to know. This includes officers in your agency who are not designated as 287(g) officers.

Initial Processing

All processing of 287(g) subjects should begin at the <u>Initial Event</u> screen to ensure proper event creation. This quick reference is designed to guide all 287(g) officers in the correct procedures for processing of aliens. There are no other acceptable methods to process 287(g) arrests. Full processing should be completed prior to turning the subject over to <u>ICE but after the</u> subject's identity, arrest and criminal history have been verified through (b)(7)e



Enforcement and approved by Marc J. Moore, Assistant Director, Field Operations:

The Criminal Alien Program (CAP) provides ICE-wide direction and support in the identification and arrest of criminal aliens who are incarcerated within federal, state, and local prisons and jails. It is incumbent upon ICE to ensure that all efforts are made to arrest and remove these individuals from the community by securing a final order of removal prior to the termination of their period of imprisonment. The identification and processing of incarcerated criminal aliens, prior to release from jails and prisons, decreases or eliminates the time spent in ICE custody, reducing the overall cost to the Federal Government.

In order to standardize database input, ensure data integrity and modernize the abilities of DRO to capture statistics, CAP has superseded the July 11, 2006 memorandum entitled *Criminal Alien Program (CAP) Case Identification* with the attached memorandum titled *Updated Directives for the Criminal Alien Program (CAP) Case Identification in ENFORCE*, as well as the processing manual.

Data quality is essential to the success of CAP and DRO. FODs are to ensure all processing for DRO's enforcement efforts comply with the attached processing manual. FODs are also requested to ensure that Senior Training Officers ensure that officers and supervisors are aware of the proper processing procedures to include the self-assignment to the proper program codes in ENFORCE when logging into the system.

Purpose

This memorandum and attached reference guide provides guidance for Office of Detention and Removal Operations (DRO) personnel regarding the processing of all Criminal Alien Program (CAP), Joint Criminal Alien Removal Taskforce (JCART), and Violent Criminal Alien Section (VCAS) cases in the Enforcement Case Tracking System (ENFORCE). This guidance supersedes the July 11, 2006, memorandum issued by John P. Torres titled "Criminal Alien Program (CAP) Case Identification in ENFORCE".

Background

One of the most important mandates of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) is the enhancement of public safety and the security of the American public. The broad authority of ICE allows for the identification and removal of dangerous, often recidivist, criminals engaged in crimes that have a profoundly negative impact on our society. A large component of this enforcement effort is identification and processing of criminal aliens incarcerated in Federal, state and local facilities. As enforcement activities are expanded, it is necessary to effectively track arrests and cases processed through ENFORCE. With continued efforts from ICE'S field offices and the ongoing cooperation by local and state authorities acting under Section 287(g) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), ICE will continue to improve its efforts through CAP to effectively track cases arrested and processed by DRO in ENFORCE for the purposes of performance measurements, resource allocation, statistical tracking and assigning personnel.

The operational components within CAP, as well as the continued partnership with Secure Communities and the Office of State and Local Coordination, provide ICE-wide direction and support in the statistical tracking, identification, apprehension, detention, and prosecution of criminal aliens at large within the United States leading to their removal.

Discussion

All processing begins at the initial event screen to ensure proper event creation. The reference guide attached to this document is designed to guide all officers in the proper procedures for processing aliens within ENFORCE for CAP, VCAS, JCART, LEAR, and the NFOP. Data

Arrests and Severity Levels

As noted, all arrests should have an appropriate Arrest Landmark associated that represents the means of the arrest. As outlined in the ENFORCE/EARM Landmark tasking dated October 30, 2008, all Field Office Directors are to ensure, through their ENFORCE Data Systems Administrators (DSA), the creation of Arrest Landmarks within ENFORCE for their area of responsibility (AOR). These landmarks are to be utilized by all DRO and 287(g) personnel when making an arrest and issuance of a charging document. The following steps should be completed in ENFORCE when the arrest and issuance of a charging document against an alien is warranted.



Establishment of the Program

The Criminal Alien Program (CAP) was under the control of ICE Investigations until December 31, 2005. Before the enactment of the Illegal Immigrant Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act (IIRAIRA) in 1996, CAP had one objective -- to locate, apprehend, and remove criminal aliens from the community and, ultimately, from the United States. Post-IIRAIRA objectives are virtually unchanged. Effective January 1, 2006, CAP will be under the control of Detention and Removal Operations and will continue to focus on location, apprehension, and removal of criminal aliens.

IIRAIRA introduced provisions prioritizing one class of criminal aliens over other classes of criminal aliens. Congress has made it exceptionally clear that criminal aliens convicted of aggravated felonies shall be given the highest priority. In IIRAIRA, Congress enacted several new sections to the INA and amended several others. These provisions include expansion of crimes qualifying as aggravated felonies; expedited removal of some aggravated felons; mandatory detention; and the establishment of limits to, or the complete elimination of, relief from removal.

Additionally, Congress amended 8 U.S.C. Section 1226 to mandate that the Attorney General devise and implement a system:

- (1) that makes available daily (on a 24-hour basis) to Federal, State, and local authorities the investigative resources of the CBP and ICE to determine whether individuals arrested by such authorities for aggravated felonies are aliens;
- (2) that designates and trains officers and employees of the ICE to serve as liaisons to Federal, State, and local law enforcement and correctional agencies and courts with respect to the arrest, the conviction, and the release of any aliens charged with aggravated felonies; and
- (3) that uses computer resources to maintain a current record of aliens who have been convicted of aggravated felonies, and that indicates those who have been removed.

Background

CAP is an aggressive enforcement effort designed to remove criminal aliens from the community and ultimately from the United States. The program is designed to *seek out* criminal aliens.

CAP is designed to give direction to Detention and Removal efforts in areas not covered by the operations of other immigration enforcement programs. Enforcement efforts are generally focused on aliens incarcerated in penal institutions either awaiting trial or serving sentences. Additional emphasis must be placed on aliens who are on parole, on probation, and in drug diversion programs or who, in any other way, pose a danger to the community by virtue of their illegal or illicit conduct. Officers should also be cognitive of recent changes in section 101(a)(43) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA) that broaden the definition of the term "aggravated felony." Many aliens residing in our communities have been convicted of crimes and have not been previously placed in removable proceedings because their convictions were not removable offenses at the time their criminal cases were adjudicated. Under current statutes, many of these aliens are now removable as aggravated felons.

Because many offices encounter an overwhelming number of aliens that qualify to be placed into removal proceedings, officers should follow a priority system in determining which cases require immediate attention, as explained below.

- (1) <u>Terrorists</u>. Any alien encountered who is suspected of being a terrorist or has been designated as a terrorist should immediately be reported to the National Security Unit (NSU) through the chain of command and be processed according to NSU instructions.
- (2) <u>Aggravated Felons</u>. The simple designation as an aggravated felon warrants priority. The Congress has made it very clear that such designated aliens are of the highest "interest" and has provided tools that facilitate removal. These tools include mandatory detention and the limitation or elimination of relief from deportation.
- (3) <u>Violent Criminals</u>. Aliens convicted of violent crimes that do not qualify as aggravated felonies should be given considerable attention. Inquiries into the nature and the actual circumstances of the crime will generate additional information that can be used to determine priority.
- (4) <u>Those Convicted of Burglary, Theft, and Fraud</u>. The general nature of these crimes significantly affects the well being of society. These are serious crimes. Nevertheless, those convicted of them do fall below aggravated felons and violent criminals in priority. If immediate pursuit of these cases is not feasible, documentation should be generated that will facilitate tracking of the alien for future action.
- (5) Other Cases. On occasion, cases will arise that have a significant local or outside interest. Some of these cases may involve aliens known to be involved in serious criminal activity but not convicted of serious crimes. Pursuit of these types of cases should involve careful evaluation of the interested parties' desires versus actual and applicable facts. It is important that agents not exceed their authority in response to pressure. Often, agents are asked to arrest individuals with little information as to their alienage or deportability. Agents should not act on hearsay until it has been properly investigated and determined

to be accurate and relevant. Agents may be asked to detain criminal aliens in excess of our authority. No agent should ever detain a subject without lawful authority. Any Agent in doubt about detaining a subject should request supervisory approval before initiating any detention.

(d) An underlying consideration when assigning priority to cases is the fiscal obligation incurred by the Agency. A significant percentage of cases encountered by CAP can be processed while the alien is in the custody of another law enforcement entity. Cases already in ICE custody, or with imminent dates of release to ICE custody, should be given priority over all other cases regardless of the nature of the offense. Careful planning and attention to these priorities will help to minimize detention costs.

In order to overcome this obstacle the officers perform record checks from the facility's roster, identify possible aliens, then conduct most interviews telephonically, this has been the most productive method of covering several facilities utilizing the least amount of resources.

The CAP unit processes then refers all prosecutable cases to the Violent Criminal Alien Section. The Violent Criminal Alien Section is a unit of it self, with a separate supervisor.

The El Paso CAP operates three shifts. Las Cruces CAP operates two shifts. **TRAINING**

(1) CAP Supervisors or their designated representative is to provide training for officers and agents assigned CAP duties.

- (2) Training shall focus on established local operational procedures, identification of criminal aliens, case preparation, and administrative proceedings.
- (3) The El Paso Field Office shall also provide training on the use of electronic databases, such as NCIC, CIS, EARM, CLAIMS, NAILS, IAFIS, IBIS, and IDENT.

LIASON WITH OTHER LAW ENFORCMENT AGENCIES

- (1) The success of CAP relies on the ability of the initiating officer to establish contact and develop working relationships with representatives of local, State and Federal law enforcement Agencies, as well as judicial and correctional agencies that regularly encounter or control significant numbers of criminal aliens. The goal of this initiative is to create a seamless web of immigration enforcement. A dialogue should be held with these officials to agree on acceptable procedures for notifying ICE of aliens involved in criminal activities. When necessary, operating procedures can be solidified with a formal Memorandum of Understanding.
 - (a) Law enforcement request/inquiries: Officer will respond to request/inquiry in the same manner as it was received. (telephonically, fax, or email)
 - (b) Officers will log request/inquiry on the "Agency Request" spreadsheet in the share drive. Officer will also annotate the disposition of the request/inquiry on same spreadsheet. On a weekly basis the CAP Detention and Removals Assistant (DRA) will input the information onto the LEA Request in Significant Event Notification System (SEN).
 - (c) Officers will also provide the facilities with CAP posters that provide contact information.
- (2) In addition to developing liaisons through routine encounters, officers and agents that are assigned to CAP must establish programs and presentations specifically geared toward educating area law enforcement and judicial groups about aliens and alien-related criminal activity. This effort is vital in establishing channels of communication by which these groups can help CAP identifying criminal aliens and in informing participants as to how CAP can assist them in their law enforcement efforts.
- (3) Similar efforts should also be directed at educating members of the community. Only through education can agents ensure awareness and understanding by the public and promote cooperation in removing criminal aliens from society.
- (4) <u>Scheduling</u>. CAP offices depend heavily on various administrative personnel (court clerks, record clerks, counsels, etc.) to effectively and efficiently process cases. Nearly all

these personnel work on weekdays and during normal business hours. CAP efforts will be concentrated to function during these operating times to maximize productivity.

ROUTINE ENCOUNTER WITH ALIENS CONVICTED OF SERIOUS CRIMES.

- (1) Because agents assigned to CAP routinely encounter aliens convicted of serious crimes, agents should always realize that their cases could be candidates for Federal prosecution. Agent's assigned CAP duties should seek guidance from their Violent Criminal Alien Section (VCAS), or local U.S. Attorney's Office, in determining what cases qualify for prosecution according to established guidelines.
- (2) Additionally, agents assigned to CAP need to request specific instructions on protocols when these types of cases are encountered. Issues of notification and processing procedures are two of the primary examples to be addressed. Any cases encountered that appear to be candidates for prosecution should be approached using criminal standards for enforcement activity, specifically the administration of rights utilizing form I-214, before taking any potentially incriminating statements.
- (3) One of the most common criminal violators encountered by agents assigned to CAP that merit prosecution is a deported criminal alien who has re-entered the United States illegally. Agents may also encounter violators of various other Federal statutes such as visa fraud, false statements, fraudulent documents, or illegal aliens and convicted felons in possession of firearms. Agents should be familiar with these types of violations and the cases should be referred to the El Paso or Las Cruces VCAS Unit.

Processing Cases

- (a) As previously mentioned, Congress provided a significant number of tools that enable ICE to more effectively and efficiently process criminal aliens. IIRAIRA amended the Immigration and Nationality Act to provide for the following:
 - (1) Administrative reinstatement of prior deportation, exclusion, and removal orders. This change in the law eliminates cumbersome deportation proceedings for most previously deported aliens.
 - (2) Administrative deportation of nonpermanent resident aliens who are convicted of aggravated felonies, again streamlining the removal process.
 - (3) An expanded definition of the term "aggravated felony." Of tantamount significance does the retroactive application of the expanded list of crimes constitute aggravated felonies.
- (b) These statutory changes combined reduce the number of cases sent before the Executive Office of Immigration Review, and in many cases, avenues of relief from removal have been eliminated completely.
- (c) The removal process involves four phases:

(1) **Identification and processing:**

Officers will interview or run record checks of all inmates who are incarcerated within federal, state and local facilities, and determine if the inmate is amenable to removal proceedings. If an alien is determined to be removable from the United States because of a violation of the Immigration & Nationality Act, the Officer will place an I-247 detainer with the facility housing the alien.

Officers will then prepare the I-247 in ENFORCE and create a work folder which will consist of a copy of the I-247 detainer, form I-213 and prints if available. Work folders will be submitted to the DRA assigned to CAP for documentation in the EARM system and enter the data into the Active Detainers worksheet and file the folder.

(2) Case preparation:

The CAP Officer will conduct the following preliminary record checks, print the results of these record checks, and place the results in the work folder or "A" file:

a. b. c. (b)(7)e d. e.

(3) Administrative proceedings

The Officer will review the record checks and determine the processing disposition. (Administrative Removal, Reinstatement of Final Orders, or Removal Hearing before an Immigration Judge).

- (a) An Administrative Removal: will require obtaining a certified copy of the Judgment and Sentencing of an aggravated felony conviction under IN&A 101(a) (43) (A)-(U) and must be approved by the Office of Chief Counsel.
- (b) A Reinstatement of Final Order: will require either the original or copy of a previous removal order and executed form I-205 or I-296. The Advisement and Waiver of Miranda Rights utilizing form I-214 is to be administered prior to taking any potentially incriminating statements, and a Record of Sworn Statement in Affidavit Form shall also be used. The case will then be referred to the VCAS Section.

(c) Removal Hearing before an Immigration Judge: The alien will be notified of consular rights and asked if he/she has any fear of torture or persecution upon returning to his country of citizenship and provided with a list of legal service providers. This information will also be included on a Record of Sworn Statement and placed in the A-file.

(4) **Removals**

Administrative Removal cases of Mexican citizens will be transported to El Paso for removal to Mexico immediately after processing. All other cases such as Other than Mexicans (OTM's) will be transported and booked into El Paso Service Processing Center to await their removal.

Reinstatement of Final Order cases will be referred to the Violent Criminal Alien Section (VCAS) for prosecution.

All Notice to Appear (NTA) cases that will appear before an Immigration Judge will be transferred to the El Paso Processing Center to await an immigration hearing. All NTA's will be referred to the Violent Criminal Alien Section (VCAS) to review for amenability to misdemeanor prosecution.

(d) Aliens convicted of committing aggravated felonies are subject to removal. Depending on the immigration status of the criminal alien, the type of removal proceedings may be one of the following:

(1) Administrative Removal.

(A) Under 8 U.S.C. Section 1228(b) of the INA, no relief from removal exists once a case meets the criteria for administrative removal proceedings. Upon initiation of the proceedings, to be met are as follows:

The individual must be an alien who is not a lawful permanent resident (LPR).

The individual must have a final conviction for an aggravated felony.

- (B) When processing the alien for this procedure, each of these elements as well as the alien's identity must be established by CAP agents.
- (2) <u>Reinstatement of Final Orders</u>. 8 U.S.C. Section 1231(a)(5) of the INA provides that the Attorney General reinstate (without referral to an immigration court) a final order against an alien who illegally reenters the United States after being deported, excluded, or removed from the United States under a final order. Before reinstating a prior order, the agent processing the case must determine:
 - (A) That the alien believed to have reentered illegally was previously deported or removed from the United States.

- (B) That the alien believed to have reentered illegally is the same alien as the one previously removed, and
- (C) That the alien did in fact illegally reenter the United States.
- (D) If the alien expresses a fear of persecution if returned, the alien should be referred to an Asylum Officer for an interview.
- (3) <u>Removal Hearing before an Immigration Judge</u>. (8 U.S.C.Section 1229): There are three circumstances whereby a removal hearing may be initiated before an immigration judge:
 - (A) If a Deciding Service Officer finds that the record of proceeding, including the alien's timely rebuttal, raises a genuine issue of material fact regarding the preliminary findings of an alien who initially has been processed as an administrative removal, the deciding officer may issue a Notice to Appear to initiate removal proceeding under 8 U.S.C. Section 1229.
 - (B) In general, all lawful permanent residents are given the opportunity to present their cases before an immigration judge.
 - (C) Aliens who have entered without inspection (EWI) who have not been convicted of aggravated felonies and have not been previously been removed are entitled to removal hearings before an immigration judge.

Detention of Criminal Aliens

- (a) <u>INA Provisions</u>. 8 U.S.C. Section 1226(c) (1) of the INA provides for detention of criminal aliens found to be inadmissible for criminal offenses described in 8 U.S.C. Section 1182(a) (2). It also states that aliens found to be removable for being members of a terrorist organization, aggravated felons, aliens convicted of two or more CIMTs, drug traffickers or abusers, aliens convicted of firearms offenses, or aliens who are a threat to national security and foreign policy shall be taken into custody. Aliens identified under 8 U.S.C. Section 1226(c)(1) should not be released from custody before the completion of removal proceedings except in situations described under 8 U.S.C. Section 1226(c)(2).
- (b) <u>Detainers</u>. Provisions for the issuance of detainers may be found in <u>8 C.F.R. 287.7</u>. Detainers are issued pursuant to 8 U.S.C. Sections 1226 and 1357. Any authorized Immigration and Customs Enforcement Officer/Agent may at any time issue a Form <u>I-247</u>, Immigration Detainer-Notice of Action, to any local, State, Federal law enforcement agency.
- (c) A detainer advises another law enforcement agency that the ICE seeks custody of an alien presently in the custody of that agency, for the purpose of arresting and removing the alien. The detainer is a request that such agency advise ICE, before release of the alien, in order for the ICE to arrange to assume custody, in situations when gaining immediate physical custody is either impracticable or impossible.

(d) <u>Availability of Records</u>. For ICE to accurately determine the propriety of issuing a detainer, serving a Notice to Appear, or taking custody of an alien in accordance with the INA, the criminal justice agency requesting such action or informing ICE of a conviction or an act that renders an alien inadmissible or removable under any provision of law shall provide ICE with all documentary records and information available from the agency that reasonably relate to the alien's status in the United States or that may affect on conditions of release.

<u>Temporary Detention at ICE Request</u>. Upon a determination by ICE to issue a detainer for an alien not otherwise detained by a criminal justice agency, such agency shall maintain custody of the alien for a period not to exceed 48 hours, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays, to permit assumption of custody by the Agency. 8 CFR 287.7(d)

This SOP is a living document and can be amended as necessary. In case of changes or amendment, all affected parties will be notified.



Subject: ERO Progress

As you know, in Fiscal Year (FY) 2011, we removed nearly 397,000 aliens, the largest number of aliens subject to removal in ICE's history. Thanks to your efforts, approximately 55 percent—more than 216,000—of those removed were convicted criminals. Since, according to national reports, more than 50 percent of those convicted criminals would have re-offended within three years, your efforts have increased public safety in our communities. We also achieved positive results with regard to our other enforcement priorities, including fugitives, previously removed aliens, and recent border entrants.

For FY 2012, to further the safety of our communities, it is my goal to build upon our past success and surpass last year's accomplishments. This year we should effect nearly 225,000 convicted criminal alien departures and increase the percentage of alien departures for other priority cases. As of last week, we have removed more than 82,000 convicted criminal aliens.

While we continue to strive to do more during the remainder of FY 2012 to successfully carry out our mission and achieve our goals, I think we have started the year off well, as reflected below in some of your "Significant Events" from January and February. Thank you for the tremendous work you have already done and will continue to do to further protect public safety and national security.

Significant Events

- Immigration Enforcement Agent Class 202's graduation on February 8, 2012 Director John Morton was the keynote speaker and I, along with the Field Office Directors gaining new Immigration Enforcement Agents, proudly attended. We will continue bringing leadership in to mark such important occasions.
- As of early March, Secure Communities interoperability an identification tool that assists you in identifying criminal aliens for removal has been activated in a total of 2,385 jurisdictions and has been fully deployed in 31 states and one territory, covering more than 83 percent of the foreign-born non-citizen population. Nation-wide activation is expected by FY 2013.
- High Profile Arrests and Removals
 - The Houston Field Office arrested and detained three subjects, two of which were wanted in Mexico for homicide. They are all currently detained pending the outcome of proceedings or a reinstatement of a prior order of removal.
 - o The Detroit Field Office arrested and detained a legal permanent resident who had recently been convicted of possession of a controlled substance. The subject will remain in custody pending

Background:

The Criminal Alien Program (CAP) provides ICE-wide direction and support in the identification and arrest of criminal aliens who are incarcerated within Federal, state, and local prisons and jails. It is incumbent upon ICE to ensure that all efforts are made to arrest and remove these individuals from the community by securing a final order of removal prior to the termination of their period of imprisonment. The identification and processing of incarcerated criminal aliens, prior to release from jails and prisons, decreases or eliminates the time spent in ICE custody, reducing the overall cost to the Federal Government.

In order to standardize database input, ensure data integrity and modernize the abilities of DRO to capture statistics, CAP has superseded the July 11, 2006, memorandum entitled *Criminal Alien Program (CAP) Case Identification* with the attached memorandum titled *Updated Directives for the Criminal Alien Program (CAP) Case Identification in ENFORCE*, as well as the processing manual.

As enforcement activities are expanded, it is necessary to accurately capture and update information in the ENFORCE. Making certain that this data is correctly captured and updated will both ensure management data integrity and provide a reliable data tracking method. To ensure that ENFORCE contains the most up to date information it is also the responsibility of ICE officers to properly book subjects in NCIC and submit final dispositions to CJIS.

The attached file contains the quarterly totals as archived for CAP removals, encounters, detainers and charging documents. Errors have been highlighted in yellow and tallied in the summary page. The summary page depicts

an overview of your field office's overall CAP efficiencies and criminality breakdown. It is requested that the errors be corrected by March 1, 2010.

As the fiscal year progresses, CAP will continue to provide support to the field offices in the creation of automated reporting and statistical gathering methodologies as well as guidance to assist in disseminating best practices and training among all the field offices.

Purpose

This memorandum and attached reference guide provides guidance for Office of Detention and Removal Operations (DRO) personnel regarding the processing of all Criminal Alien Program (CAP), Joint Criminal Alien Removal Taskforce (JCART), and Violent Criminal Alien Section (VCAS) cases in the Enforcement Case Tracking System (ENFORCE). This guidance supersedes the July 11, 2006, memorandum issued by John P. Torres titled "Criminal Alien Program (CAP) Case Identification in ENFORCE".

Background

One of the most important mandates of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) is the enhancement of public safety and the security of the American public. The broad authority of ICE allows for the identification and removal of dangerous, often recidivist, criminals engaged in crimes that have a profoundly negative impact on our society. A large component of this enforcement effort is identification and processing of criminal aliens incarcerated in Federal, state and local facilities. As enforcement activities are expanded, it is necessary to effectively track arrests and cases processed through ENFORCE. With continued efforts from ICE'S field offices and the ongoing cooperation by local and state authorities acting under Section 287(g) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), ICE will continue to improve its efforts through CAP to effectively track cases arrested and processed by DRO in ENFORCE for the purposes of performance measurements, resource allocation, statistical tracking and assigning personnel.

The operational components within CAP, as well as the continued partnership with Secure Communities and the Office of State and Local Coordination, provide ICE-wide direction and support in the statistical tracking, identification, apprehension, detention, and prosecution of criminal aliens at large within the United States leading to their removal.

Discussion

All processing begins at the initial event screen to ensure proper event creation. The reference guide attached to this document is designed to guide all officers in the proper procedures for processing aliens within ENFORCE for CAP, VCAS, JCART, LEAR, and the NFOP. Data

Arrests and Severity Levels

As noted, all arrests should have an appropriate Arrest Landmark associated that represents the means of the arrest. As outlined in the ENFORCE/EARM Landmark tasking dated October 30, 2008, all Field Office Directors are to ensure, through their ENFORCE Data Systems Administrators (DSA), the creation of Arrest Landmarks within ENFORCE for their area of responsibility (AOR). These landmarks are to be utilized by all DRO and 287(g) personnel when making an arrest and issuance of a charging document. The following steps should be completed in ENFORCE when the arrest and issuance of a charging document against an alien is warranted.

After initial processing through full client and at the time the subject is to be placed in ICE custody users will continue processing the Arrest from the **ARREST TAB**:

There has been a number of questions raised by the Field to HQ regarding the May 29th email from Director Mead which specified the targeting of Level 1 and Level 2 criminal aliens. AD Greg Archambeault and I met with Mr. Mead and Mr.

Homan yesterday on this particular subject. For clarification, the **targeting** restriction of Level 1s and 2s only applies to Fug Ops activities and teams. There are no **targeting** restrictions that apply to other ERO enforcement activities related to criminal aliens (CAP, 287g, Secure Communities, VCAS, JCART).

I understand that in reality, the separation of Fug Ops and CAP activities which target at large criminal aliens in the field may be difficult to achieve and report but I believe it can be easily addressed in the assignment of targets – i.e. assign at large Level 1 and Level 2 targets to the Fug Ops teams and Level 3 to CAP teams.

If this has only confused this issue more, then please see me Monday, June 18th at the NSA conference to discuss further. I will be holding my last FOD meeting around 5:00 pm in the lobby of the Radisson Hotel.

DRO and OCC must work together on every one of these cases. If DRO is notified of the claim to US citizenship, the Officer will notify their appropriate AFOD to investigate the claim. If OCC is notified of a claim to citizenship, they will notify the appropriate AFOD. The OCC POC for all these cases will be Deputy Chief Counsel (b)(6), (b)(7)c DRO POCs: AFOD (6), (b)(7)c EPC, AFOD (6), (b)(7)c Otero, AFOD

(b)(6), (b)(7)c for Pecos, AFOQb(6), (b)(7) for Albuquerque, and AFOD for Compliance (b)(6), (b)(7)c will designate). Any other area not identified will be referred to the appropriate DFOD.

Once we (DRO) have taken appropriate action to conduct the investigation, the memorandum (template attached) will be completed and forwarded from AFOD to DFOD/FOD. The memo will then be forwarded to OCC for their completion. Once OCC has completed their portion of the memo, the memo will be forwarded back to the FOD/DRO for final DRO review and signature, followed by OCC signature. Final signed memos will be forwarded to the appropriate mailbox. In all instances, the file and work product will be hand carried to avoid delays by mail.

These cases must be placed on the highest priority and must be worked on a fast track. Absent any extraordinary circumstances, this notification memorandum must be submitted 24 hours from the time the claim was made. A Message from Assistant Secretary Morton

To all ICE Employees November 25, 2009

Preventing Placement of U.S. Citizens in Detention or Removal Proceedings

I am pleased to announce that I have instituted new procedures to prevent the placement of U.S. citizens in detention or removal proceedings.

While ICE would not knowingly detain or begin removal proceedings against a U.S. citizen, the laws related to derivative citizenship are complex and leave open the possibility that an individual subject to an ICE investigation may not know their citizenship status.

The burden of proving citizenship is upon the individual claiming citizenship. However, ICE often affirmatively investigates claims of citizenship in order to prevent claims that the agency improperly removed a non-alien.

To ensure that this proactive investigation occurs in all cases, I have instituted procedural safeguards that require agents, officers and attorneys to investigate all claims of citizenship. I have also mandated that local Offices of the Chief Counsel be consulted in each investigation.

This enhanced process will result in a formal record of the steps ICE took to resolve a particular citizenship claim. As ICE fairly regularly faces criticism about such cases, this will allow ICE to better defend our actions. This new process will also allow ICE to identify ways to improve and streamline citizenship determinations in the future.

I am confident that these safeguards will protect the agency and prevent unnecessary legal actions. This directive is effective immediately.

This memorandum supersedes the guidance issued on November 6, 2008, entitled "Superseding Guidance on Reporting and Investigating Claims to United States Citizenship." This guidance is intended to ensure claims to U.S. citizenship receive immediate and careful investigation and analysis.

While performing their duties, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) officers, agents, and attorneys, may encounter aliens who are not certain of their status or claim to be United States citizens (USC). As the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA) provides numerous avenues for a person to derive or acquire U.S. citizenship, ICE officers, agents, and attorneys, should handle these matters with the utmost care and highest priority. While some cases may be easily resolved, because of the complexity of citizenship and nationality law, many may require additional investigation and substantial legal analysis. As a matter of law, ICE cannot assert its civil immigration enforcement authority to arrest and/or detain a USC. Consequently, investigations into an individual's claim to U.S. citizenship should be prioritized and Office of Investigations (OI) and Detention and Removal Operations (DRO) personnel must consult with the Office of the Principal Legal Advisor's (OPLA) local Office of the Chief Counsel (OCC) as discussed below.

Claims at the Time of Encounter

When officers and agents encounter an individual who they suspect is without lawful status but claims to be a USC, the situation will fall into one of three categories: 1) evidence indicates the person is a USC; 2) some evidence indicates that the individual may be a USC but is inconclusive; and 3) no probative evidence indicates the individual is a USC. If evidence indicates the individual is a USC, ICE should neither arrest nor place the individual in removal proceedings. Where there is *some* probative evidence that the individual is a USC, officers and agents should consult with their local OCC as soon as practicable. After evaluating the claim, if the evidence of U.S. citizenship outweighs evidence to the contrary, the individual should not be taken into custody. The person may, however, still be placed in removal proceedings if there is reason to believe the

individual is in the United States in violation of law. Finally, where no probative evidence of U.S. citizenship exists and there is reason to believe the individual is in the United States in violation of law, the individual may be arrested and processed for removal. In all cases, any uncertainty about whether the evidence is probative of U.S. citizenship should weigh against detention.

Claims by Individuals Subject to an NTA

Agents and officers must fully investigate the merits of any claim to citizenship made by an individual who is subject to a Notice to Appear (NTA), whether the claim was made before or after the NTA was served on the individual. Such investigations should be prioritized and OI and DRO personnel should consult with their local OCC as soon as practicable when investigating such claims. In addition, OI and DRO, along with their local OCC, must jointly prepare a memorandum examining the claim using the attached template. A notation should be made in the Enforce Alien Removal Module (EARM) and a copy of the memorandum should be placed in the alien's A-file. The memorandum should also be saved in the General Counsel Electronic Management System (GEMS) and notated using the designated GEMS barcode.

Claims by Detained Individuals

If an individual already in custody claims to be a USC, an officer must immediately examine the merits of the claim and notify and consult with his or her local OCC. If the individual is unrepresented, an officer must immediately provide the individual with the local Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) list of pro bono legal service providers, even if one was previously provided.

DRO and OPLA must also jointly prepare and submit a memorandum examining the claim and recommending a course of action to the HQDRO Assistant Director for Operations at the (6), (b)(7)c e-mailbox and to the HQOPLA Director of Field Operations at the (b)(6), (b)(7)c e-mailbox. Absent extraordinary circumstances, this memorandum should be submitted no more than 24 hours from the time the individual made the claim. HQDRO and HQOPLA will respond to the field with a decision on the recommendation within 24 hours. A notation should be made in EARM and a copy of the memorandum and resulting decision should be placed in the alien's A-file. The memorandum and resulting decision should also be saved in GEMS and notated using the designated GEMS barcode.

If the individual's claim is credible on its face, or if the investigation results in probative evidence that the detained individual is a USC, the individual should be released from detention. Any significant change in circumstances should be reported to the (b)(6), (b)(7)c e-mailbox and the (b)(6), (b)(7)c e-mailbox.

Examination of the Merits

Interviews with detainees making such claims must be conducted by an officer or agent in the presence of and/or in conjunction with a supervisor. Interviews will be recorded as sworn statements and must include all questions needed to complete all fields on a Record of Deportable

Alien, Form I-213. In addition, the sworn statement must include additional probative questions designed to elicit information sufficient to allow a thorough investigation of the person's claim of citizenship. Additional steps to be taken may include vital records searches, family interviews, and other appropriate investigative measures. Officers and agents should also work with their local United States Attorney's Office to ensure that any statement includes information sufficient to use in prosecuting appropriate cases under 18 U.S.C. § 911, should it ultimately come to light that the individual intentionally made a false claim to U.S. citizenship.

State and Local Officers with Authority under INA § 287(g)

Field Office Directors (FODs) and Special Agents in Charge (SACs) shall ensure that all state and local officers with delegated immigration authority pursuant to INA § 287(g) within their area of responsibility understand and adhere to this policy. FODs and SACs are expected to thoroughly investigate all USC claims made by individuals encountered by 287(g) designated officers.





This memorandum provides guidance on the use of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) detainers in the federal, state, local, and tribal criminal justice systems. This guidance applies to all uses of ICE detainers regardless of whether the contemplated use arises out of the Criminal Alien Program, Secure Communities, a 287(g) agreement, or any other ICE enforcement effort. This guidance does not govern the use of detainers by U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP). This guidance replaces Sections 4.2 and 4.5 of the August 2010 Interim Guidance on Detainers (Policy Number 10074.1) and otherwise supplements the remaining sections of that same guidance.

Background

In the memorandum entitled Civil Immigration Enforcement: Priorities for the Apprehension, Detention, and Removal of Aliens, issued in June 2010, ICE set forth clear priorities that guide its civil immigration enforcement. These priorities ensure that ICE's finite enforcement resources are dedicated, to the greatest extent possible, to individuals whose removal promotes public safety, national security, border security, and the integrity of the immigration system.

As ICE's implementation of these priorities continues, it is of critical importance that ICE remain focused on ensuring that the priorities are uniformly, transparently, and effectively pursued. To that end, ICE issues the following guidance governing the use of detainers in the nation's criminal justice system at the federal, state, local, and tribal levels. This guidance will ensure that the agency's use of detainers in the criminal justice system uniformly applies the

principles set forth in the June 2010 memorandum and is consistent with the agency's enforcement priorities.

National Detainer Guidance

Consistent with ICE's civil enforcement priorities and absent extraordinary circumstances, ICE agents and officers should issue a detainer in the federal, state, local, or tribal criminal justice systems against an individual only where (1) they have reason to believe the individual is an alien subject to removal from the United States and (2) one or more of the following conditions apply:

- the individual has a prior felony conviction or has been charged with a felony offense;
- the individual has three or more prior misdemeanor convictions;2
- the individual has a prior misdemeanor conviction or has been charged with a misdemeanor offense if the misdemeanor conviction or pending charge involves
 - o violence, threats, or assault;
 - o sexual abuse or exploitation;
 - o driving under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance;
 - o unlawful flight from the scene of an accident;
 - o unlawful possession or use of a firearm or other deadly weapon;
 - o the distribution or trafficking of a controlled substance; or
 - o other significant threat to public safety;³
- the individual has been convicted of illegal entry pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1325;
- · the individual has illegally re-entered the country after a previous removal or return;
- the individual has an outstanding order of removal;
- the individual has been found by an immigration officer or an immigration judge to have knowingly committed immigration fraud; or
- the individual otherwise poses a significant risk to national security, border security, or public safety.⁴

² Given limited enforcement resources, three or more convictions for minor traffic misdemeanors or other relatively minor misdemeanors alone should not trigger a detainer unless the convictions reflect a clear and continuing danger to others or disregard for the law.

³ A significant threat to public safety is one which poses a significant risk of harm or injury to a person or property.

⁴ For example, the individual is a suspected terrorist, a known gang member, or the subject of an outstanding felony arrest warrant; or the detainer is issued in furtherance of an ongoing felony criminal or national security investigation.

Revised Detainer Form

To ensure consistent application of this guidance, ICE will revise the DHS detainer form, Form I-247. The revised detainer form, which should be used in all cases once it is issued, will specifically list the grounds above and require the issuing officer or agent to identify those that apply so that the receiving agency and alien will know the specific basis for the detainer. The changes to the form will make it easy for officers and agents to document the immigration enforcement priorities and prosecutorial discretion analysis they have completed leading to the issuance of the detainer.

Prosecutorial Discretion

This guidance identifies those removable aliens in the federal, state, local, and tribal criminal justice systems for whom a detainer may be considered. It does not require a detainer in each case, and all ICE officers, agents, and attorneys should continue to evaluate the merits of each case based on the June 2011 memorandum entitled Exercising Prosecutorial Discretion Consistent with the Civil Immigration Enforcement Priorities of the Agency for the Apprehension, Detention, and Removal of Aliens and other applicable agency policies.

Six-Month Review

ICE Field Office Directors, Chief Counsel, and Special Agents in Charge should closely evaluate the implementation and effect of this guidance in their respective jurisdictions for a period of six months from the date of this memorandum. Based on the results of this evaluation, ICE will consider whether modifications, if any, are needed.

Disclaimer

This guidance does not create or confer any right or benefit on any person or party, public or private. Nothing in this guidance should be construed to limit ICE's power to apprehend, charge, detain, administratively prosecute, or remove any alien unlawfully in the United States or to limit the legal authority of ICE or its personnel to enforce federal immigration law. Similarly, this guidance, which may be modified, superseded, or rescinded at any time, is not intended to, does not, and may not be relied upon to create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law by any party in any administrative, civil, or criminal matter.

This guidance does not cover or control those detainers issued by officers and agents of CBP. Detainers issued by CBP officers and agents shall remain governed by existing CBP policy, and nothing in this guidance is intended to limit CBP's power to apprehend, charge, detain, or remove any alien unlawfully in the United States.



Your immigration files and any supplemental documentation that you provided were reviewed at that time. After reviewing all available information, ICE has determined that parole is not appropriate in your case at this time based on the following reason(s):
 You have not established your identity to the satisfaction of ICE. ☐ You did not present valid, government-issued documentation of identity, or any documents you submitted did not, to ICE's satisfaction, establish your identity. ☐ You did not provide third-party verification of your identity, or any third-party information you provided did not, to ICE's satisfaction, establish your identity. ☐ You did not, to ICE's satisfaction, establish your identity through credible statements.
 ☐ You have not established to ICE's satisfaction that you are not a flight risk. ☐ You failed to provide, to ICE's satisfaction, a valid U.S. address where you will reside while your immigration case is pending. ☐ You did not establish, to ICE's satisfaction, substantial ties to the community. ☐ Imposition of a bond or other conditions of parole would not ensure, to ICE's satisfaction,

your appearance at required immigration hearings pending the outcome of your case.

You have not established to ICE's satisfaction that you are not a danger to the community or U.S. security. In making this determination, ICE has taken into account any evidence of past criminal activity, activity contrary to U.S. national security interests, activity giving rise to concerns of public safety or danger to the community, disciplinary infractions or incidents, or other criminal or detention history that shows you have harmed or would likely harm yourself or others.
Additional exceptional, overriding factors (e.g., law enforcement interests or potential foreign policy consequences) in your case militate against parole, as follows:
☐ ICE previously provided you with a written decision declining to grant parole, and you have failed to provide additional documentation or to demonstrate any significant changed circumstances which would alter ICE's previous determination.
You may request a redetermination of this decision in writing, based upon changed circumstances in your case or additional documentation you would like ICE to consider. Such changed circumstances or documentation should relate to the reason(s) indicated above why ICE is not paroling you from custody at this time. For example, if you have not established your identity to ICE's satisfaction, you may wish to consider providing previously unfurnished government-issued documents such as passports, birth certificates, or identity cards. Identity can also be established through written statements prepared by individuals whom you know in the United States and whose identity ICE can verify to its satisfaction. These statements should include the address of the person you know in the United States and evidence of his or her identity. Finally, if there are multiple grounds checked above, you should try to provide further evidence addressing each of them.
If you request redetermination of this decision, please direct your written request to the address above, include a copy of this letter and any other prior ICE written decision(s) declining to grant you parole, and clearly explain what changed circumstances or additional documents you would like considered. Failure to provide satisfactory documentation and explanation may result in a denial of your request for redetermination.

Subject: Unadjusted Refugee Guidance Update

The attached memorandum clarifies when and under what circumstances DRO field offices may detain refugees who have failed to adjust to lawful permanent resident (LPR) status. In particular, please pay close attention to the following:

- DRO Field Offices should only take unadjusted refugees into custody upon a "reasonable belief" of removability.
- Unadjusted refugees are not removable simply because they failed to timely adjust status under INA § 209(a); instead, an appropriate charge based on misconduct (e.g., fraud, criminal convictions) must be used as the basis for DRO to initiate removal proceedings.
- Any decision to place an unadjusted refugee into removal proceedings must be made within 48 hours of when the alien enters DRO custody.
- DRO Field Offices must promptly release unadjusted refugees who they decide not to place in removal proceedings and, in all cases, must release the aliens once the 48-hour mark is reached even if a charging decision has not yet been made.
- Custody of unadjusted refugees arrested by DRO should be handled under INA § 236, meaning that some aliens will be subject to mandatory detention and others will be eligible for release when they meet established criteria for discretionary release under INA § 236(a) (i.e., not a flight risk or danger to the community).
- NTA drafting for unadjusted refugees can be challenging, as there is uncertainty in the law right now. But one clear rule is that DRO should not be charging unadjusted refugees as "arriving aliens," and the Offices of Chief Counsel can assist with other drafting.

<u>Purpose</u>

This memorandum clarifies when and under what circumstances U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Office of Detention and Removal Operations (DRO) Field Offices may detain refugees who have failed to adjust to lawful permanent resident (LPR) status. To the extent that any provisions of this memorandum may appear inconsistent with Chapter 11.19(e) or other provisions of the Detention and Removal Operations Policy and Procedure Manual, this memorandum should be followed.

Background

An alien resettled in the United States under the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program is conditionally admitted to the United States as a "refugee" under section 207 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA or Act). Section 209(a)(1) of the Act, entitled "Adjustment of Status of Refugees," generally provides that after such refugees have been physically present in the United States for at least one year, they "shall, at the end of such period, return or be returned to the custody of the Department of Homeland Security for inspection and examination for admission to the United States as an immigrant in accordance with [INA §§ 235, 240, and 241]."

Although this language creates a clear expectation that refugees should present themselves for adjustment to LPR status after one year's physical presence in the United States, ICE officers and agents occasionally encounter refugees who have failed to timely apply for adjustment of status under INA § 209(a). Such encounters most often occur when a refugee has been apprehended by other law enforcement agencies for suspected criminal activity.

Notice: This memorandum is intended to provide internal operational and policy guidance to ICE personnel. It does not, is not intended to, shall not be construed to, and may not be relied upon to, create any rights, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law by any person in any matter, criminal or civil.

¹ The Policy and Procedure Manual should be promptly revised, in consultation with the Office of the Principal Legal Advisor, to reflect the approach outlined in this memorandum.

Subject: Detention of Refugees Admitted Under INA § 207 Who Have Failed to Adjust Status Page 2

Under section 209(a) of the Act, refugees are subject to examination and inspection by USCIS for admission to the United States as an LPR after one year's physical presence. Failure by such individuals to apply for adjustment of status under this provision is not a sufficient ground to place them in removal proceedings, and therefore not a proper basis for detaining them. ICE, however, may charge a refugee with removability, consistent with the guidance below, if one or more grounds apply even if the individual's refugee status has not been terminated. Moreover, if USCIS denies a refugee's application for adjustment of status, USCIS may place the individual in removal proceedings as a new applicant for admission, charging any applicable grounds of inadmissibility under section 212 of the Act. See 8 C.F.R. § 209.1(e).

Discussion

ICE has arrest authority over aliens under section 287(a)(2) of the Act and detention authority under sections 235 and 236, among other provisions of law. Except in case of emergency or other extraordinary circumstances, upon the arrest of an unadjusted refugee upon reasonable belief of removability, a DRO Field Office must determine, no later than 48 hours after the arrest, whether to release the individual or issue a Notice to Appear (NTA), Form I-862, indicating the removal charge(s) applicable to the alien. See 8 C.F.R. § 287.3(d); Memorandum from Asa Hutchinson, Undersecretary for Border and Transp. Sec., Guidance on ICE Implementation of Policy and Practice Changes Recommended by the Dep't of Justice Inspector Gen. 2 (Mar. 30, 2004). If it becomes apparent earlier that no removability ground applies, the individual must be released promptly.

Accordingly, upon taking an unadjusted refugee into custody based upon a reasonable belief that he or she is removable, the DRO Field Office first must finalize its determination whether to place the individual in removal proceedings under INA § 240 and, if so, whether to continue detention. A refugee may not be placed in removal proceedings based on a failure to adjust status or to apply for adjustment of status because an alien's failure to adjust status or apply for adjustment under INA § 209(a) is not a ground of removability. Therefore, the only way DRO may place an unadjusted refugee in proceedings is if a violation of the INA can be established that is unrelated to the alien's failure to adjust, such as fraud or a criminal conviction that forms the basis for a charge under INA §§ 212 or 237.

The DRO Field Office, in the exercise of discretion, may make a determination to issue an NTA to any unadjusted refugee for whom it believes there is prima facie evidence of inadmissibility under INA § 212(a) or deportability under INA § 237(a), regardless of whether the individual's refugee status has been terminated and even if USCIS has not yet considered the refugee's adjustment application. Although DHS is working to achieve clarity in the law, some immigration courts have taken varied positions on whether someone initially admitted as a refugee under INA § 207 is most appropriately charged under section 212 or 237 of the Act. It is critical, therefore, that DRO Field Offices work closely with ICE Offices of Chief Counsel (OCCs) to identify the most appropriate charge(s) and draft legally sufficient NTAs.²

It does not, is not intended to, shall not be construed to, and may not be relied upon to, create any rights, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law by any person in any matter, criminal or civil.

² Refugees admitted under INA § 207 who are not seeking readmission at a port-of-entry, however, should not be considered arriving aliens as defined in 8 C.F.R. § 1.1(q).

Subject: Detention of Refugees Admitted Under INA § 207 Who Have Failed to Adjust Status Page 3

Any NTA must be served on the alien promptly, and service must in any case be accomplished within 72 hours of arrest in the absence of emergency or other extraordinary circumstances. For unadjusted refugees who are placed in removal proceedings, DRO should make custody determinations under section 236 of the Act.³

If it is determined that the individual should be placed in removal proceedings, DRO Field Office personnel should also attempt to ascertain, through examination of available records systems and direct questioning of the alien, whether he or she has applied for adjustment of status under INA § 209(a). If no application has been filed, the DRO Field Office should promptly notify its corresponding USCIS Field Office Director, or a point-of-contact designated by the USCIS Field Office Director, of the decision to charge, so that USCIS can commence the adjustment process pursuant to INA § 209(a) and 8 C.F.R. § 209.1. The DRO Field Office should advise the alien that he or she is required by law to apply for adjustment of status and provide the alien with a copy of the Form I-485 (Application to Register Permanent Residence or Adjust Status) and Form I-602 (Application by Refugee for Waiver of Grounds of Excludability), and corresponding instructions, which are all available on the USCIS public website. To the fullest extent possible, these forms should be completed by the alien before he or she is released from custody. DRO Field Offices should make a copy of the forms for the alien and provide the originals to the USCIS Field Office Director (or designee).

In addition to providing USCIS with identifying information (including full name, alien registration number, and date of birth pertaining to the alien), a DRO Field Office should provide an explanation of how the alien came to be in ICE custody. This information, particularly if it entails a criminal arrest or conviction, may be relevant to USCIS's determination whether to grant adjustment of status.

If a determination to place an unadjusted refugee in removal proceedings has not been made within the initial 48-hour period discussed above, the DRO Field Office should release the alien with a reminder that the INA imposes an obligation upon him or her to apply for adjustment of status under section 209(a) and to provide DHS with updated address information under section

³ Under INA § 236(a), with limited exceptions, ICE has discretion to release aliens on bond or on their own recognizance, or to continue detention based on a variety of factors, such as whether the alien poses a danger to persons or property, is a threat to national security, or poses a risk of flight. See Matter of Guerra, 24 I&N Dec. 37, 38 (BIA 2006). Section 236(c) of the Act, however, requires ICE to continue the detention of certain aliens, including aliens who are inadmissible or deportable either for having committed certain crimes or by operation of the national security grounds of INA §§ 212(a)(3)(B) or 237(a)(4)(B).

⁴ In addition, all DRO Field Offices should clearly identify in the Enforcement Alien Removals Module (EARM) all unadjusted refugees in their custody and be able to provide real-time data on the number of such individuals to DRO Headquarters upon request.

⁵ If an alien declines to complete the forms, the DRO Field Office should fill in part 1 of both forms, which contains only basic biographical information. In addition, on the I-485 form, the DRO Field Office should check box "h" of part 2, add a corresponding notation in the blank space next to the checkbox that reads, "Applicant admitted to the United States as refugee, but declined to complete application required by INA 209(a). Part 1 of this form completed by ICE," and complete Part 5, entitled "Signature of Person Preparing Form, If Other Than Above," in its entirety. On the I-602 form, the DRO Field Office should add a note at the end of part 2 that reads, "Applicant declined to complete form. Part 1 of this form completed by ICE."

265. The DRO Field Office should notify the USCIS District Director (or designee) of the release and provide USCIS with any information obtained from the alien regarding where he or she currently resides.

Attachment

When to Detain Refugees Who Have Failed to Adjust to Lawful Permanent Resident Status: Key Points

The May 10, 2010, DRO memorandum, "Detention of Refugees Admitted Under INA § 207 Who Have Failed to Adjust to Lawful Permanent Resident Status," ICE Policy 11039.1, clarifies the circumstances under which you may detain aliens admitted to the United States as "refugees" who failed to adjust status within one year of admission ("unadjusted refugees") as provided in INA § 209(a). Specifically:

- Failure to adjust status in accordance with the provisions of INA § 209(a) does not in itself constitute grounds for removability for an unadjusted refugee.
 - Do not take an unadjusted refugee into custody unless you have a "reasonable belief" that the alien is removable.
 - Removability will generally relate to criminal misconduct or immigration fraud, including, possibly, fraud related to the initial resettlement in the United States. See INA §§ 212(a)(2), (a)(6)(C), 237(a)(1)(A), or (a)(2).*
- You must decide whether to initiate removal proceedings within 48 hours of taking the unadjusted refugee into DRO custody.
 - Upon deciding against removal, promptly release the unadjusted refugee.
 - At the 48-hour mark, release the individual, even if you are still weighing pros and cons.
 - Do not charge an unadjusted refugee as an "arriving alien."
 - Under existing ICE policy, in the absence of emergency or other extraordinary circumstances, Notices to Appear (NTAs) must be served on aliens within 72 hours of arrest.
- Coordinate with local USCIS when placing an unadjusted refugee into removal proceedings.
 - To expedite the adjustment of status process, you may have to provide the adjustment and waiver forms (I-485 and I-602) to the unadjusted refugee and, if he/she will not cooperate, fill out portions of the paperwork yourself, then forward it to USCIS.
- Follow normal INA § 236 procedures when making a custody determination.
 - Unless an alien is subject to mandatory detention, you should exercise discretion and consider such factors as flight risk and danger to the community in deciding whether to release the individual.
 - The Alternatives to Detention program could be appropriate.

On August 23, 2012, EAD Mead signed *ICE Reporting Guidance* and superseded the November 12, 2004 Victor Cerda <u>Orders of Supervision</u> memorandum. Both documents may be accessed in the ERO Resource library via the embedded hypertext links.

Policy: Field Offices are authorized to exercise discretion in establishing reporting requirements of an alien released on an Order of Recognizance (OREC) or Order of Supervision (OSUP); specifically, how often aliens will report to ICE. At a minimum, aliens released on OREC or OSUP must report at least once per year.

Each alien's case and reporting requirements may be reassessed and modified based on the alien's level of compliance, ICE detention and enforcement priorities, changes to circumstances of the individual case, and as a matter of discretion. Supervisory Detention and Deportation Officers are responsible for reviewing and approving changes to reporting requirements.

Additional guidance regarding a new OREC and OSUP reporting is forthcoming.



I. Situation

CAP Surge Operations (Surge) will comprehensively address the incarcerated foreign-born felon population within the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ, the Texas state prison system). This Surge will coincide with the implementation of Secure Communities interoperability in TDCJ, which combined with existing procedures, provides a mechanism to ensure all inmates booked into and released from TDCJ are screened for alienage and removability for the duration of the operation. Those who are determined to have no status, or to have violated their status, will immediately be processed and placed into appropriate immigration proceedings.

Surge Operations will be conducted within the Houston, San Antonio, and Dallas Field Office Areas of Operational Responsibility (AORs). The DEPORT Center within the Chicago AOR will support the surge in all AORs. The El Paso Field Office will support the Surge under a separate operational plan.

The Houston Field Office is coordinating this effort as historically, the Huntsville sub-office has operated the Texas Institutional Removal Program (IRP), and the Huntsville office serves as the primary release point to ICE for incarcerated alien felons. With the implementation of interoperability, responses for all state cases will be routed to Huntsville. These responses will include females, state jail, and treatment center cases historically addressed by other Texas field offices. The Surge will address the backlog of claimed foreign-born detainees requiring interviews and processing, allowing the Huntsville staff to address the incoming population identified under Secure Communities interoperability going forward.

2

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The respective Field Office Directors (FODs), Deputy Field Office Director (DFODs), and Assistant Field Office Director (AFODs) have all been briefed on this operational plan; and they each support its execution upon approval from HQDRO provided the conditions/concerns identified below are satisfied.

A) Targeted Facilities

115 State Prisons, State Jails, and State Contract Facilities (See
 ATTACHMENT A) - During the Surge, it is estimated that 4,200
 criminal aliens, not previously identified will be processed for removal
 from the United States. The El Paso will address 3 facilities in a separate
 operational plan.

B) Hours of Operation

During the Surge, the current incarcerated population in the TDCJ will be screened and processed for removal. The incoming population and releases will be addressed through Secure Communities interoperability and existing IRP procedures.

Coverage outside of these hours will be accomplished by Houston Field Office established procedures related to duty CAP assignments. Supervisory staff will change shift hours as needed, in order to effectively facilitate the operation.

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(2) DEPORT Center Chicago Field Office

The DEPORT Center will address approximately 1,923 foreign born felons housed in 67 prison units. During the Surge, the DEPORT center will operate (b)(7)e

The DEPORT Center will provide the Huntsville Institutional Removal Program (Huntsville IRP) with an interview schedule 48 hours in advance of planned activity, allowing local management to schedule activity in conjunction with existing workload. The Huntsville IRP will make appropriate notifications to the State and to the LESC to coordinate entry.

Scheduling and coverage outside of these hours will be accomplished by Chicago Field Office established procedures related to duty CAP assignments. Supervisory staff will change shift hours as needed, in order to effectively facilitate the operation.

(3) Huntsville Institutional Removal Program (IRP) Houston Field Office

The Huntsville IRP will address approximately 407 foreign born felons housed in 14 prison units and will receive and address an estimated 400 interoperability responses in conjunction with the Surge. In addition, the Huntsville office will provide administrative and logistical support to field units and other participating field offices during the Surge. The Huntsville IRP will operate (b)(7)e (CST during Surge operations.

Scheduling and coverage outside of these hours will be accomplished by Houston Field Office established procedures related to duty CAP assignments. Supervisory staff will change shift hours as needed, in order to effectively facilitate the operation.

(4) Houston Contract Detention Facility (CDF) CAP Operations Houston Field Office

The Houston CDF will address approximately 416 foreign born felons housed in 6 prison units. The Houston CDF operates with 24/7 staffing.

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The Houston CDF will provide the Huntsville IRP with an interview schedule 48 hours in advance of planned activity, allowing local management to schedule activity in conjunction with existing workload. The Huntsville IRP will make appropriate notifications to the State and to the LESC.

Scheduling will be accomplished by Houston Field Office established procedures related to duty CAP assignments. Supervisory staff will change shift hours as needed, in order to effectively facilitate the operation.

(5) Beaumont Sub-Office CAP Operations Houston Field Office

The Beaumont Sub-Office will address approximately 227 foreign born felons housed in 6 prison units. The Beaumont sub-office will provide the Huntsville IRP with an interview schedule 48 hours in advance of planned activity, allowing local management to schedule activity in conjunction with existing workload.

Scheduling and coverage will be accomplished by the Houston Field Office established procedures related to duty CAP assignments. Supervisory staff will change shift hours as needed, in order to effectively facilitate the operation.

(6) Polk County Detention Facility DRO Operations Houston Field Office

The Polk County Detention Facility will address approximately 63 foreign born felons housed in the Polunsky prison unit. The Polk office will provide the Huntsville IRP with an interview schedule 48 hours in advance of planned activity, allowing local management to schedule activity in conjunction with existing workload.

Scheduling and coverage will be accomplished by the Houston Field Office established procedures related to duty CAP assignments. Supervisory staff will change shift hours as needed, in order to effectively facilitate the operation.

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(7) San Antonio Field Office CAP Operations San Antonio Field Office

The San Antonio Field Office will address approximately 100 foreign born felons housed in the Dominguez unit. The San Antonio Field Office will provide the Huntsville IRP with an interview schedule 48 hours in advance of planned activity, allowing local management to schedule activity in conjunction with existing workload.

Scheduling and coverage will be accomplished by the San Antonio Field Office established procedures related to duty CAP assignments. Supervisory staff will change shift hours as needed, in order to effectively facilitate the operation.

(8) Harlingen Resident Office CAP Operations San Antonio Field Office

The Harlingen Resident Office will address approximately 64 foreign born felons housed under contract in Willacy County. The San Antonio Field Office will provide the Huntsville IRP with an interview schedule 48 hours in advance of planned activity, allowing local management to schedule activity in conjunction with existing workload.

Community Issues or Politically Sensitive Issues

Three days prior to the execution of the Surge, the Field Office will provide the Office of Public Affairs (OPA) and Office of Congressional Relations (OCR) with the specifics of the operation, including the operational dates and location of the initiative. Due to social and political climates, this operation may result in a negative response from the communities in which it is conducted. However, as the Surge operation addresses a less controversial population of incarcerated alien felons, no negative response is anticipated.

D) Prosecutions

In instances where an alien is amenable to prosecution (e.g. re-entry, false claims), the case will be referred to the Field Office where the alien was encountered using the attached form (*See ATTACHMENT C*). Each Field Office has provided Points of Contact (POC) for this Surge (See **ATTACHMENT D**). The Field Office POCs will, in turn, coordinate presentation to United States Attorneys Office (USAO) having jurisdictional venue for criminal prosecution. These presentations will be noted in (b)(7)e

II. Mission

The primary objective of the Criminal Alien Program (CAP) is to ensure that all criminal aliens serving criminal sentences are processed for removal prior to their release from Federal, state and local custody. This intention affirms the ultimate mission of ICE/DRO, which is to effect the removal of criminal aliens upon being turned over to ICE custody. CAP strives to ensure that all incarcerated foreign-born nationals are screened; and where applicable, processed for removal from the United States

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Execution

A) Director's Intent

CAP's primary objective is to ensure that all criminal aliens serving criminal sentences are processed for removal prior to their release from Federal, State and local custody.

B) Concept of Operations

The Field Office will implement Surge Operations to comprehensively address the incarcerated foreign-born felon population within the TDCJ. This Surge will coincide with the implementation of Secure Communities interoperability in TDCJ, providing a mechanism to all inmates booked into and released from targeted facilities are screened for alienage and removability for the duration of the operation.

As efforts progress, field office resources may be reassigned to other geographical areas to meet operational needs; or returned to their official duty posts, as deemed appropriate by the SDDO. A liaison officer will be responsible for establishing and coordinating operations with correction officials at target facilities where Surge Operations will be conducted. Overtime will be used consistent with the laws, regulations, policies and where applicable union agreements governing Overtime in a manner that will best satisfy the overall enforcement objective.

DRO enforcement personnel will identify themselves as ICE Officers or Agents to all persons questioned. ICE Officers/Agents will only wear official ICE uniforms and indentifying equipment. In addition, all personnel will follow ICE policy to carry ICE credentials to prove the authorization that enables them to perform the various functions involved in the Surge Operation.

This operation will consist of 32 days of Surge activities being executed in the TDCJ from May 4, 2009 through June 5, 2009.

Phase I: May 1, 2009: Operational briefing at (b)(7)e CST by conference call with the Chicago, San Antonio, Dallas, and El Paso Field Offices. May 4, 2009: Operational briefing will be conducted with local and detailed staff at (b)(7)e (b)(7)e CST at the Houston Contract Detention Facility, (b)(7)e at the Houston Contract Detention Facility, and (b)(7)e at the Huntsville office. All officers participating in the operation will attend this pre-operational briefing.

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<u>Phase II</u>: May 4, 2009: Officers from the Houston and various Temporary Duty (TDY) Field Offices will deploy to the first MPV site to initiate screening. Other participating offices begin Surge operations as outlined in this document.

<u>Phase III</u>: June 8, 2009: If deemed necessary, the Houston ICE OPA will issue a press release following the completion of the operation, once approved by the FOD.

C) Tasks

- 1. The POC for communications with HQ CAP Operations Unit is AFOD

 Tracking spreadsheet (See ATTACHMENT E) with updated statistics.
- 2. Participating field offices will provide detainers, interview results, and processing disposition relating to the Surge to the Houston POCs reflected in ATTACHMENT D. This information is necessary not only to accurately complete HQ CAP reports, but also to provide necessary information to the State regarding the alienage and removability of the foreign-born inmates.
- 3. Fugitive Operations Support Center (FOSC): A copy of the Operational Plan and preliminary target list will be provided to the FOSC on April 17, 2009. An updated inmate roster will be provided to the FOSC on May 1, 2009, prior to commencement of the Surge. The target list will be updated as needed as the Surge progresses.
- 4. The Law Enforcement Support Center (LESC) is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week and can provide support for the Surge. By April 27, 2009, LESC Section Chief will be notified of the dates and times of the operation. Officers/agents participating in the operation should have the contact number for the LESC and a PIN number.
- 5. Detention Operations Coordination Center (DOCC): Detention space is available within the Houston Field Office AOR, and sufficient detention locations have been identified. Due to the criminal sentences of the targets, the Surge is not expected to immediately impact local detention

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capacity. All Texas field offices have agreed to assist in the event of emergent releases outside of the Houston AOR.

D) Safety and Logistics

- Mandatory Element: <u>Safety is paramount</u>. All personnel participating in the operation will be aware of local facility emergency procedures; and a team leader will be assigned to ensure that these procedures are followed. On-site staff will coordinate with the Warden or the Warden's designee for a security briefing prior to entering the facility.
- 2. Primary processing location: Aliens will be primarily processed on-site in the MPV, at the DEPORT center, or at locations within the San Antonio Field Office. Cases encountered in the Houston AOR from the designated facilities that require immediate transfer to ICE will be transported to the Houston Contract Detention Facility, 5520 Greens Road, Houston, Texas, 77032 for processing. All transportation will be conducted in accordance with DRO policies.
 - a. Secondary detention and processing site(s) to be determined as needed. The El Paso, Dallas, and San Antonio field offices have agreed to address urgent and emergency prison releases in their respective AORs during the Surge.
 - b. The SDDO will coordinate requests for additional staff to support Surge Operations. Requests will be made through the appropriate AFOD with concurrence from the Houston FOD.

3. Logistics.

- a. Lodging and per diem expenses will be required for the Surge Operation including (7) rental car per every) (7) TDY personnel. In the event that the need arises to utilize lodging and per diem, funding will be requested from HQ CAP.
- b. The Surge Operation will not require any Health & Safety inspections at any facility.

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- 4. Removal Efforts: It is the intent of the FOD to process all removable aliens in an expeditious manner. The below actions will be performed to facilitate this objective:
 - Immediately upon determination of alienage and removability, an Immigration detainer, form I-247, will be logged using the ENFORCE system.
 - b. Arrests that require a Notice to Appear (NTA) will not be presented with the option of a Stipulated Removal as the Executive Office for Immigration Review will not proceed with Stipulated Orders for unrepresented aliens. All other immigration proceedings will be utilized as applicable.



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
week and Mexican flights may be required to offset increased detentions. *Note*: The following positions from the above personnel will be required on TDY for thirty days following the end of the CAP surge to provide supplemental coverage related to the cases released as a result of detainers placed during the surge (b)(7) PRAs; per day. Since DRA's are not on AUO, an additional DRA was added to the late shift.

Coverage outside of these hours will be accomplished by Atlanta Field Office established procedures related to duty CAP assignments. Supervisory staff will change shift hours as needed, in order to effectively facilitate the operation.

C) Staffing

The Surge will require additional support from outside the field office. The FOD has committed all available resources within his or her jurisdiction. An initial request was forwarded to HQ on December 22, 2008 and, following discussion with HQ CAP, the staffing numbers were reduced as shown below.

[NOTE: The Atlanta Field Office detention capacity is challenged by the current incoming case trends (approximately 450 per week) and the lack of sufficient Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) resources to process the 60% of cases (approximately 270 per week) that historically have venue with EOIR. As discussed in Section C.4. below, available options to mitigate detention capacity concerns are DOCC/FOU flights together with the use of Voluntary Return (VR) in a manner comparable to Voluntary Departure (VD) thresholds (i.e. aliens not

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chargeable as aggravated felons or under security grounds). An additional option to mitigate detention capacity is the detail of EOIR adjudicative resources sufficient to adjudicate 350+ cases per week during this operation and for a three-week period following the conclusion of the operation.]

D) Community Issues or Politically Sensitive Issues

Three days prior to the execution of the Surge, the Field Office will provide the Office of Public Affairs (OPA) and Office of Congressional Relations (OCR) with the specifics of the operation, including the operational dates and location of the initiative. Due to social and political climates, this operation may result in a negative response from the communities in which it is conducted.

E) Prosecutions

In instances where an alien is amenable to prosecution (e.g. re-entry, false claims), the case will be presented to the United States Attorneys Office (AUSA) for criminal prosecution. These presentations will be noted in (b)(7)e

II. Mission

The primary objective of the Criminal Alien Program (CAP) is to ensure that all criminal aliens serving criminal sentences are processed for removal prior to their release from Federal, State and local custody. This intention affirms the ultimate mission of ICE/DRO, which is to effect the removal of criminal aliens upon being turned over to ICE custody. CAP strives to ensure that all incarcerated foreign-born nationals are screened; and where applicable, processed for removal from the United States. CAP Surge Operations are an enhanced part of this effort with a goal to ensure 100% of all inmates booked into and released from targeted facilities are screened for alienage and removability and when applicable, processed for removal from the United States.

Execution

A) Director's Intent

CAP's primary objective is to ensure that all criminal aliens serving criminal sentences are processed for removal prior to their release from Federal, State and local custody.

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B) Concept of Operations

The Field Office will implement Surge Operations to facilitate the screening of 100% of all persons booked into and released from targeted facilities and sustain this level of screening for the duration of the Surge Operation.

As efforts progress, field office resources may be reassigned to other geographical areas to meet operational needs; or returned to their official duty posts, as deemed appropriate by the SDDO. A liaison officer will be responsible for establishing and coordinating operations with correction officials at target facilities where Surge Operations will be conducted. Over Time will be used consistent with the laws, regulations, policies and where applicable union agreements governing Over Time in a manner that will best satisfy the overall enforcement objective.

DRO enforcement personnel will identify themselves as ICE Officers or Agents to all persons questioned. ICE Officers/Agents will only wear official ICE uniforms and indentifying equipment. In addition, all personnel will follow ICE policy to carry ICE credentials to prove the authorization that enables them to perform the various functions involved in the Surge Operation.

This operation will consist of 26 days of surge activities being executed at the Gwinnett County Jail from January 14, 2009 through February 5, 2009.

<u>Phase I</u>: January 13, 2009: Operational briefing at ______ (b)(7)e _____ at the Atlanta Field Office. All officers participating in the operation will attend this preoperational briefing.

<u>Phase II</u>: January 14, 2009: Officers from the Atlanta and various TDY Field Office will deploy to the Gwinnett County Jail to initiate screening.

<u>Phase III</u>: February 6, 2009: If deemed necessary, the Charlotte, North Carolina Public Affairs Office will issue a press release following the completion of the operation, once approved by the FOD.

C) Tasks

1. The Point of Contact (POC) for communications with HQCAP Operations Unit is (b)(6), (b)(7)c AFOD(b)(6), (b)(7)cell phone number is 404-926)(6), (b)(7)c and his desk number is 404-898)(6), (b)(7)The AFOD for CAP will report to

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HQCAP Operations each Friday by Noon EST, using the CAP Surge Tracking spreadsheet with updated statistics.

- 2. Fugitive Operations Support Center (FOSC): A copy of the Operational Plan and target list has been sent to the FOSC. Provide FOSC with inmate roster prior to commencement of the SURGE.
- 3. The Law Enforcement Support Center (LESC) is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week and can provide support for the Surge. On December 22, 2008, Section Chief (b)(6), (b)(7)c (802) 87@+(6), (b)(1) was notified of the dates and times of the operation. Officers/agents participating in the operation should have the contact number for the LESC and a PIN number.
- 4. Detention Operations Coordination Center (DOCC): Detention space is limited within the Atlanta Field Office AOR, and sufficient detention locations have not been identified. DOCC assistance, inculding the identification of detention space in advance of the operation, is an essential component on this plan.
- 5. A-File Availability: Another essential component to the overall success of this operation is the unrestricted availability of A-files from Citizenship and Immigration Services (CIS). Recently CIS has placed significant restrictions on the availability of empty jacket A-files. If empty jacket A-files are not made available to the Atlanta Field Office, the processing of aliens for removal will be precluded and the operation will be comprised. DRO Headquarters support in obtaining an adequate number of empty jacket A-files (2,600) from CIS is critical to the success of this operation as CIS has restricted the Atlanta Field Office to 250 empty jacket A-files per request.

D) Safety and Logistics

1. Mandatory Element: <u>Safety is paramount</u>. All personnel participating in the operation will be aware of local facility emergency procedures; and a team leader will be assigned to ensure that these procedures are followed.

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- 2. Primary processing location: Aliens encountered from the designated facility that require immediate transfer to ICE will be transported to the Atlanta Field Office Holding Cells, 180 Spring St., SW, Atlanta, GA 30303 for processing. All transportation will be conducted in accordance with DRO policies.
 - a. Secondary detention and processing site(s) to be determined as needed.
 - b. The SDDO will coordinate requests for additional staff to support Surge Operations. Requests will be made through the appropriate AFOD with concurrence from the Atlanta FOD.

3. Logistics.

- a. Lodging and per diem expenses will be required for the Surge Operation including)(7) rental car per every)(7) TDY personnel. In the event that the need arises to utilize lodging and per diem, funding will be requested from CAPHQ.
- b. The Surge Operation will not require any Health & Safety inspections at any facility.
- 4. Removal Efforts: It is the intent of the FOD to process all removable aliens in an expeditious manner. The below actions will be performed to facilitate this objective:
 - a. Immediately upon determination of alienage and removability, an Immigration detainer, form I-247, will be logged using the ENFORCE system.
 - b. All arrests that require a Notice to Appear (NTA) will be presented with the option of a Stipulated Removal if applicable to the Field Office's AOR. The OPLA/Alfie Owens and EOIR/ (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) have been advised and contacted as to the availability to approve stipulated removals during the Surge. As noted above EOIR does not have the adjudicative capacity to maintain pace with current removal proceeding caseloads. The Atlanta Field Office requests that consideration be given to TDY EOIR resources or a VR threshold comparable with VD. All other Immigration

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proceedings will be utilized as applicable to ensure the most expeditious processing of cases.

c. DRO personnel will be instructed to secure and place any and all identity documents relating to each removable subject in the "A" file. Additionally, they will be instructed to ensure that photocopies are placed in the subjects' "A" file. DRO personnel will make every legal effort to secure these documents.

E) General Reporting Requirements

1. Weekly Reports: Submitted to the AFOD and HQCAP Operations Unit utilizing the "Surge Activity Report" spreadsheet.

Period Covered: Friday through Thursday (0001-2400 hours)

- 2. Weekly Reports: Standard HQCAP reporting.
- 3. Significant Event Notification (SEN): A SEN/SIR will need to be submitted only if events or incidences occur that warrant their submission in accordance with established policy and procedures.
- 4. Report Format: At the conclusion of the Surge, the field office's POC to the CAP Operations Unit, previously identified above, will ensure that HQCAP is properly supplied with the final statistical report for the Surge. This will be due by 1400 hours the day after completion of Surge Operations.

F) After Action Reporting Requirements

- 1. Initial after action conferences will be conducted as follows:
 - a. Key operational personnel involved in the final Phase(s) of the Surge will be held on February 5, 2009 at the Atlanta Field Office.
- 2. Format: The format for issues will be:

- 3. Formal after action report: A memorandum of results will be generated and forwarded to the FOD for review.

National Operation Cross Check V (CCV) is a targeted enforcement operation focusing on atlarge criminal aliens with Secure Communities Levels 1 and 2 convictions, as well as Level 3 convictions for crimes of violence or involving a threat to public safety. CCV will utilize the (b)(7)e Fugitive Operations Teams in all 24 field offices, with each team targeting at large criminal aliens per team. The operational phase is from Wednesday, August 14, 2013, through Saturday, August 17, 2013.

Pertinent examples of crimes that would fall within the targeting parameters of Level 3 crimes, include but are not limited:

Crimes of Violence

Assault

- Battery
- Domestic Violence

Threat to Public Safety

- Weapons Violations
- DUI (conviction within the last three years)

Each FOD will need to review their target list to ensure that all Level 3 targets meet the Crime of Violence/Public Safety Threat criteria and should coordinate this review with their local Offices of Chief Counsel. 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OPERATION CROSS CHECK V

Dates: August 14 - 17, 2013

I. Situation

The objective of Operation Cross Check V is to apply an organized, methodical approach to the identification, location and arrest of at-large criminal aliens with Secure Communities Levels 1 and 2 convictions, as well as Level 3 convictions for crimes of violence or involving a threat to public safety. This operation will occur in all 24 ERO Field Office Areas of Operational Responsibility (AOR), consistent with the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) enforcement priorities.

Operation Cross Check V will utilize the (b)(7) Fugitive Operations Teams (FOTs) located within the 24 AORs and agents from corresponding ICE Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Special Agent in Charge (SAC) offices across the country. Resources from CAP and the Detained/Non-Detained units will also participate in this enforcement operation.

Prior to commencement of the operation, teams will evaluate lead information to identify at-large criminal aliens. Target cases amenable to prosecution will be presented to the U.S. Attorney's Office (USAO) in pursuit of criminal arrest warrants to include, but not limited to, 8 USC 1326 and 8 USC 1253. Prosecutions for other offenses will be guided by the August 20, 2007 memorandum, DRO/OI Protocols. ERO will also collaborate with U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services to evaluate criminal alien case referrals for inclusion in the operation.

Upon approval of this operational plan, Field Office Directors (FOD) will collaborate with each USAO in their respective AORs to seek cooperation in obtaining criminal arrest warrants, indictments and acceptance of prosecutions.

In addition, the FODs are directed to coordinate with the local SAC, as well as other federal, state and local law enforcement agencies (LEAs) to encourage their participation in this operation. FODs should coordinate with the United States Marshals Service (USMS) Regional Task Forces, local USMS task forces, and other law enforcement partners. Arrangements should be made with the USMS to ensure space requirements and coordinate initial appearances. Local probation and parole offices should also be consulted in target development and 4th amendment waiver considerations during operations.

This operation will consist of four (4) days of enforcement activity executed simultaneously across all 24 ERO field offices from August 14 - 17, 2013.

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The Executive Associate Director (EAD), Deputy Executive Associate Director (Deputy EAD), Assistant Director (AD) for Secure Communities and Enforcement, and the Field Office Directors (FODs) have been briefed on this operational plan and support its execution.

A) Targeted Aliens $-(3,225^1)$

The b)(7) FOTs will target approximately 3,225 at-large criminal aliens nationwide (b)(7)e Teams will generate target lists of criminal aliens with Secure Communities Levels 1 and 2 convictions, as well as Level 3 convictions for crimes of violence or involving a threat to public safety.

By August 2, 2013, each field office will compile a target list, which the FOD must review and approve, prior to submission to the Fugitive Operations Support Center (FOSC) and NFOP for review. Once approved by HQ, the final lists will be disseminated to the respective FODs.

Enforcement actions may also be taken against non-targeted aliens encountered during the course of this operation who are determined to be removable and found to present a public safety threat or otherwise meet ICE's enforcement priorities, as provided in this operation plan. If safe to do so, and if there is articulable reasonable suspicion that the non-targeted aliens encountered during the operation may be in the United States unlawfully, they should be checked for criminal and immigration histories while at the arrest location or taken to an ERO office and checked as quickly as possible. Based on the Prosecutorial Discretion Guidelines, appropriate charging and detention decisions should be made on a case-by-case basis. (See attached Excel spreadsheet for target list.)

B) Hours of Operation

Procedures. Supervisory staff will change shift hours as needed in order to facilitate the operation.

When a daily target list has been exhausted early in the day, consideration should be given to pursuing additional targets and/or conducting additional casework related to identified targets.

C) Local Situation

Th (b)(7)e FOTs will conduct the operation with other resources from local CAP and Detained/Non-Detained units, as well as the following Law Enforcement Agencies (LEAs): see attachment. The FODs must commit all necessary resources within their jurisdictions. (See attached Excel spreadsheet for Team and LEA breakdown)

D) Operational De-Confliction

HSI has been advised of the operation and has stated that they do not anticipate any conflict in the targeted areas, and have agreed to participate. The target list will be queried in (b)(7)e to ensure deconfliction with HSI and other law enforcement entities.

E) Local Law Enforcement Agencies (LEAs)

The FOT Supervisory Detention and Deportation Officer (SDDO) shall advise local LEAs prior to the execution of any Headquarters (HQ) approved or FOD approved fugitive operation plan. The standard operating procedures for local law enforcement agencies will vary from location to location and should be established through proactive liaison. During the course of the operation, if a target is found to be in an area outside the jurisdictions originally notified as part of the plan, every reasonable effort will be made to notify the newly affected LEA prior to the FOT's arrival and, if that is not possible, as soon as practicable thereafter. In the presence of exigent circumstances, it may be prudent to not provide notification of impending fugitive operations within each jurisdiction. (If this is the case, the FOD must be made aware of these circumstances and concur with written justification not to notify the local LEAs.)

F) Sensitive Locations and 4th Amendment

Potential enforcement activities near sensitive locations as defined in the October 24, 2011, <u>Enforcement Actions at or Focused on Sensitive Locations</u> policy memorandum, will be avoided unless operationally necessary, and only then when in compliance with the memorandum. Pre-planned operations conducted near a

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sensitive area must be reviewed and approved in writing by the FOD and Headquarters according to the memorandum, and outlined in this section of the operational plan. All personnel assigned to the operation will be briefed on the policy prior to the operation and that briefing documentation will be attached to the plan. (List locations and targets here)

All personnel assigned to the operation must be current on 4th Amendment training requirements. In addition, FODs may choose to seek additional training by the Office of Chief Counsel prior to the operation, as is the case with national operations. During the pre-operational briefing, the Office of Chief Counsel will provide a 4th Amendment overview.

G) Community Issues or Politically Sensitive Issues

HQERO will provide the ICE Offices of Public Affairs (OPA) and Congressional Relations (OCR) with the specifics of the operation, to include the operational dates and location of the initiative. If the operation can reasonably be expected to result in a negative community response, this must be specifically communicated to these offices and the Assistant Director for Field Operations. No proactive outreach shall be conducted with non-law enforcement entities on the planning or execution of this operation.

H) Juveniles

The presence of juveniles at a target location, or in the care of a targeted alien, will be explored during initial investigation, surveillance and diligent research of available indices. In the event that minors are identified, or likely to be encountered at a particular residence, family members, care providers and community, as well as state and county juvenile resources, will be identified and a plan of care for the juveniles will be addressed prior to the commencement of operations. Juveniles will be turned over to county resources only as a last resort. Prosecutorial discretion will be applied as appropriate. Officers will limit contact with any identified juvenile to the extent officer safety is not compromised. In addition, the utmost care and consideration will be used when dealing with juveniles, especially when juveniles are present during interviews or encounters with adults. The questioning of juveniles will be kept to a minimum and conducted in the least threatening manner and environment possible. (List names and ages of known juveniles, and plan of care including care giver contact name and numbers. If there are no juveniles on target list, state so here.)

If unaccompanied alien juveniles are encountered, the local juvenile coordinator will be contacted for guidance. If this person is unavailable, the Office of Refugee

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In the event that juvenile(s) is/are present, and their presence was not anticipated during operational enforcement activities, the FOT SDDO and team leaders may need to seek assistance from the state or local governmental agency responsible for juvenile issues, i.e. Child Protective Services (CPS). As such, the FOT SDDO and team leaders will be in possession of the agency's appropriate contact numbers, to be used as deemed necessary throughout the entirety of the operation. **List agency names, contacts and phone numbers here or see attachment.**

Whenever possible, juveniles will be placed in the care of immediate family members that have no ascertainable criminal history. If there are no other options, primary care providers who fall within ICE enforcement priorities and are subject to removal but have no ascertainable criminal record, may be placed on an Order of Supervision or Order of Release on Recognizance with SDDO/AFOD approval.

I) Prosecutions

In instances where an alien is amenable to prosecution, the case will be presented to the United States Attorney's Office/State Attorney's Office as appropriate. If the case is accepted for prosecution, an I-247, Immigration Detainer, will be filed with the agency assuming custody of the alien. If the United States Attorney's Office/State Attorney's Office declines to prosecute, the declination will be recorded in the narrative portion of the I-213 and included in the file.

J) Gangs

In the event ICE personnel encounter an alien affiliated with a street gang, officers must record the appropriate information on Form I-213 and photograph any tattoos. A copy of the I-213 and photos will be forwarded to the officer responsible for entering the subject's information into the ICE gang database. Entry of information into the ICEGangs database about suspected gang members and associates is required within 72 hours of encounter. Where operationally safe, photos will be taken in residences where gang tags and/or paraphernalia are prevalent, to include a photo of the front of the house for future officer safety concerns.

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II. Mission

To identify, arrest, and remove aliens who present a danger to national security or are a risk to public safety, as well as those who enter the United States illegally or otherwise undermine the integrity of our immigration laws and our border control efforts. ERO upholds America's immigration laws at, within, and beyond our borders through efficient enforcement and removal operations.

One of the most important ICE mandates is the enhancement of public safety and the security of the American public. The broad authority of ICE allows for the identification and removal of dangerous, often recidivist, criminals engaged in crimes such as murder,

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predatory sexual offenses, narcotics trafficking, alien smuggling, and a host of other crimes that have a profoundly negative impact on our society. The Fugitive Operations Division supports this mandate by performing strategic planning and establishing policy designed to augment ICE's ability to arrest and remove these aliens from the United States.

Operation Cross Check V is a targeted, organized, methodical approach to the identification, location and arrest of at-large criminal aliens with Secure Communities Levels 1 and 2 convictions, as well as Level 3 convictions for crimes of violence or involving a threat to public safety.

III. Execution

A) Director's Intent

This operation is being conducted in furtherance of ICE's enforcement priorities. The objective of these priorities is the enhancement of public safety and the security of the American public. The broad authority of ICE allows for the identification and removal of dangerous, often recidivist, criminals engaged in crimes such as murder, predatory sexual offenses, narcotics trafficking, alien smuggling, and a host of other crimes that have a profoundly negative impact on our society.

B) Concept of Operations

The operation will consist of multiple arrest teams dispatched throughout the 24 ERO field offices across the United States. The teams will consist of members of the (b)(7)eFOTs; the teams will also be assisted by Deportation Officers (DOs) and Immigration Enforcement Agents (IEAs) from the Criminal Alien Program (CAP) and the detained and non-detained sections of local ERO offices. One DO will be assigned as the team leader for each team and one will be assigned as the File Control Officer (FCO). The teams will be assigned unmarked vehicles as well as secure transport vehicles for use during this operation.

As arrest efforts progress, team resources may be reassigned to other geographical areas to meet operational needs or returned to their official duty posts as deemed appropriate by the SDDO/AFOD. A liaison will be established with local law enforcement offices in the areas in which arrest efforts will be conducted.

This operation will consist of four (4) days of enforcement activities from August 14, 2013, through August 17, 2013.

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- August 13, 2013: Operational briefing. All officers participating in the operation will attend the pre-operational briefing. The briefings must include a representative from the Office of Chief Counsel to address Fourth Amendment and other pertinent legal considerations. In addition, all officers involved in the Operation Cross Check V are required to complete 4th Amendment refresher training prior to commencement of the operation.
- August 14, 2013 to August 17, 2013: Arrest teams will deploy throughout the country to initiate arrests.
- August 19, 2013: Upon review and approval of the ERO Executive Associate Director, ICE HQ OPA may issue a press release.

C) Tasks

- 1. The NFOP and FOSC: A copy of the Operational Plan and target list will be sent to the FOSC and NFOP via the (b)(6), (b)(7)c Mailbox. Submissions must include the Operational Plan, Signed FOD Signature Page, Target List, and Personnel breakdown, along with any additional attachments as necessary.
- 2. The Law Enforcement Support Center (LESC) is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week and will provide support to FOTs conducting operations. All officers/agents participating in the operation should have the contact number for the LESC: 802-872 (6), (b)(7) When calling the LESC, officers should be prepared to provide their individual LESC officer ID number.
- 3. HQ/Field Operations: Prior to the operation, NFOP will provide HQ/Field Operations with a copy of the approved operational plan.

Each FOD will be responsible for identifying suitable detention space within their AOR. Should additional detention resources be required, the FOD will coordinate locating those resources with HQ/Field Operations.

IV. Administration

A) Safety

Mandatory Element: Safety is paramount.

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1. (b)(7)e

2. Beyond verbally identifying themselves as law enforcement officers, all enforcement personnel must utilize law enforcement identifiers, such as neck badges, belt badges, and outer garments affixed with ICE identifiers. In order to ensure uniformity, outer garments, if utilized during the operation, must be prominently affixed with both the words "ICE" and "Police."

3. (b)(7)e

4. No additional training will be necessary prior to this operation.

B) Logistics

- 1. Primary processing location: All detainees will be transported to local detention facilities for processing.
 - a. Secondary detention and processing site(s) to be determined as needed
 - b. The SDDO will coordinate requests for additional staff to support the enforcement operation. Requests will be made through the FOT AFOD with concurrence from the appropriate FODs.
- 2. Lodging and per diem: Lodging and per diem expenses **are not authorized** for this operation.
- 3. Removal efforts: Pursuant to ERO's goal of expeditiously removing all aliens with final orders, the below actions will be performed to facilitate this objective:
 - a. Once arrested, all detainees will be transported to the nearest ERO office for initial processing. All files will be reviewed by the FOT team leader/SDDO for legal sufficiency prior to the alien being transferred to an appropriate detention facility.
 - No health & safety inspection is required for any facility or equipment being utilized for this operation.
 - No contracts need to be reevaluated.

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- b. Each operational team has been instructed to secure any and all legally issued identity documents for all arrestees who will require a travel document for removal. All teams will make every legal effort to secure these documents prior to departing the arrest location. Obtaining these documents at the time of arrest will greatly decrease time spent in detention.
- c. Any non-fugitive arrests that require a Notice to Appear will be presented with the option of a Stipulated Removal to aid in the reduction of detention time, if deemed appropriate by supervisory personnel given the circumstances. To the extent possible, FODs will work with their Office of Chief Counsel and EOIR to ensure their availability to approve stipulated removals during the operation.
- d. FOTs will not *target* aliens outside the scope of Operation Cross Check V, although other removable aliens falling within ICE enforcement priorities may be arrested as appropriate if encountered during the operation, and circumstances dictate such action, in accordance with existing policy.
- e. Prosecutorial discretion in immigration enforcement matters must be exercised, consistent with all established guidelines with supervisory oversight, by ICE officers/agents. This applies at all levels during the execution of the operation and could be applied during the pre-arrest, arrest, and custody phase. Communication within the local field office is imperative and nothing within this operation plan should be interpreted to supersede local management oversight and execution of prosecutorial discretion protocols.
- f. When appropriate, a form of alternative to detention may be utilized if authorized by supervisory personnel.

List alternative methods here if utilized.

C) General Reporting Requirements

1. Daily Reports: Submitted to the AFOD, FOSC via established protocols, and NFOP via the (b)(6), (b)(7)c Mailbox utilizing the HQ approved FOSC reporting database designed to capture nationwide at-large surge operation statistics. Reports will be submitted once a day by 1600 hours Eastern

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Daylight Time (EDT) for the day's activities up to the submission of the report.

- 2. ALL ENFORCE entries pursuant to this operation will use "Cross Check V" in the operational dropdown on the initial event screen.
- 3. ALL Fugitive Case Management System (FCMS) entries pursuant to this operation will use "Cross Check V" in the operational dropdown on the arrest screen.

Quality Assurance: An officer(s), and support staff as needed, who are not involved with the operation, will review target files against the daily report to ensure that the statistics reported are accurate. This review must be completed daily and at the conclusion of the operation. If asked to provide statistics prior to validation, the information must be clearly identified as not validated and subject to change.

- g. Weekly Reports: Standard HQ FUGOPS reporting via FCMS.
- h. Significant Event Notification (SEN): A SEN/Significant Incident Report (SIR)/Significant Proposed Enforcement Activity Report (SPEAR) will only need to be submitted if events or incidents occur that warrant their generation in accordance with established policies and procedures.
- i. Report Format: At the conclusion of daily operations, each team leader will ensure that the FCMS is properly updated with all FOT arrests and that these arrests are validated in ENFORCE.

D) After-Action Reporting Requirements

- 1. Field Offices should conduct an after-action briefing as soon as practicable after completion of the operation and before the after-action conference.
- 2. NFOP will conduct a national after-action teleconference on August 21, 2013 for key operational and administrative personnel involved in the final phase(s) of the enforcement operation.
 - 3. Format: The format for issues will be:
 - a. Topic
 - b. Discussion
 - c. Recommendation(s)

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- 4. Formal after action report: A memorandum of results will be generated and forwarded to the FOD for review as necessary.
- 5. HQ ICE OPA will coordinate with the Assistant Director for Secure Communities & Enforcement and generate a press release upon completion of the operation as necessary. ICE Public Affairs contact number(s) are available as necessary.

Criminal Alien Program (IRP\CAP)

The Criminal Alien Division is responsible for identifying, processing, and initiating removal proceedings for criminal aliens in City, County, State, and Federal prisons and jails within the 52 county AOR of the Houston Field Office.

The Huntsville Institutional Removal Program (IRP\CAP) is one of the nations largest Institutional Hearing Programs (IRP) in the United States. This program identifies criminal aliens serving prison sentences for the entire state of Texas Criminal Justice Prison System. There are more than 12,000 aliens identified in the Texas prison system. In Fiscal Year 2012, there were more than 4,569 aliens released to ICE custody with nearly 70% of those aliens having final orders of removal prior to their release.

Houston is located in Harris County, Texas, which has the third largest county jail in the United States with over 7,000 inmates detained on any given day. The Houston Field has a vibrant Criminal Alien Program (CAP) operation. The Houston Field Office CAP operation is averaging over seven hundred (700) apprehensions per month.

The CAP operation has aggressively worked to improve relations with local law enforcement in the Houston Police Department, Harris County Sheriff's Department, and numerous local law enforcement agencies within the Houston AOR. 
As you know, the highest U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) immigration enforcement priority is the enhancement of national security and community safety through the removal of criminal aliens. While we have already increased our focus on apprehending and removing criminal aliens, I want to further enhance our attention to this priority. All Fugitive Operations, Joint Criminal Alien Removal Taskforce, and Violent Criminal Alien Section teams are to concentrate on targeting and arresting removable Level 1 and Level 2 criminal aliens. While the teams will increase their efforts to identify and work these specific cases, aliens fitting other immigration enforcement priorities who are encountered during targeted operations, should be arrested and processed consistent with current policies and procedures. Other immigration enforcement priorities include: serious Level 3 criminal aliens, ICE fugitives, re-entrants, and recent border crossers. Prosecutions should be considered on a case by case basis.

Offices that have been identified to participate in expanding the number of fugitive operations teams from should immediately take the necessary steps to assemble and activate the additional teams. Field Office Directors are expected to follow local union requirements as appropriate.

Please be sure to use all available Alternatives to Detention resources, stipulated removals, administrative removals, and voluntary returns to support this effort as appropriate.

In addition, coordinate closely with Chief Counsels and Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Special Agents in Charge to maximize their support of this effort, particularly the apprehension of Level 1 and Level 2 criminal aliens by HSI.

All other enforcement activities including Criminal Alien Program, 287g, and Secure Communities should continue as they have been over the past several months.


