
Hispanic Americans are active in the labor force in the Houston metro area, making up

VOTING POWER

In 2019, there were nearly


1.2 million

eligible Hispanic voters in the metro area, including more than

312,000

Hispanic naturalized citizens.

Overall, the Hispanic population made up **27.8%** of the electorate in the metro area, including Hispanic naturalized citizens who on their own made up **7.3%**.
